HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS. A NY even-numbered section of Do-minion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be home-steaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be made an Agency on certain conditions by the cather, mother, son, daughter, brother or fater of an intending homesteader.

An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be nigible for homestead entry. DUTIES -(1) At least six months' esidence upon and cultivation of the

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned olely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST MINING REGULATIONS COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,560 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton;

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee \$5.00, At least \$100.00 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the mining Recorder. When \$500.00 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an

Prof. James Ewing, of the medical department of Cornell University, discancer, and after carefully surveying all the evidence, he discards the parasite theory. He does not deny all relation between parasites and malignant tumors, for he finds that in one sense certain well-known micro-orranisms seem to act as indirect, exciting agents of tumors. For example, cancer of the stomach is sometimes the sequel of an uner, of epithelioma, of lupus or tuberculosis of the skin. But in the latter case tubercle bacillus gradually or suddenly disappears from the field, and the tumor process continues from its own intrinsic forces. Dr. Ewing, timrefore, infers that external irritants and parasites are concerned only with the inception of tumors, and then indirectly, and that there is little or no basis for the theory of a special cancer parasite and of the necessity of a continuous irritant propagated by a micro-organism throughout the course of a malignant tumor. Dr. Ewing rather inclines to the theory of "cell autonomy"-that is, that certain cells of the haman body, under certain conditions, seem to have an autonomous power of growth and reproduction, like the cells of the lowest hanges the mechanical pressure of cells on each other or the distributing nutriment, may disturb the balance and set a group of cells free on course of abnormal development and multiplication.
