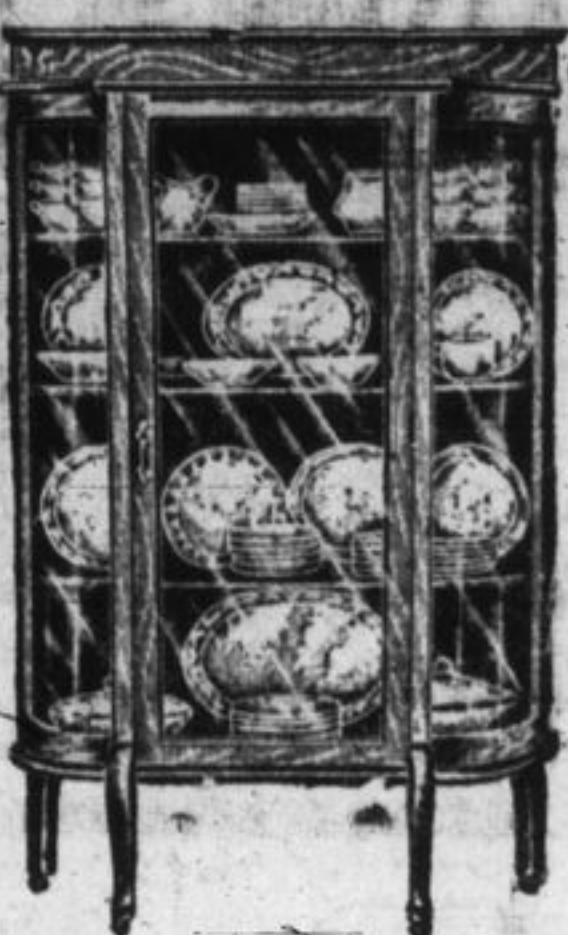

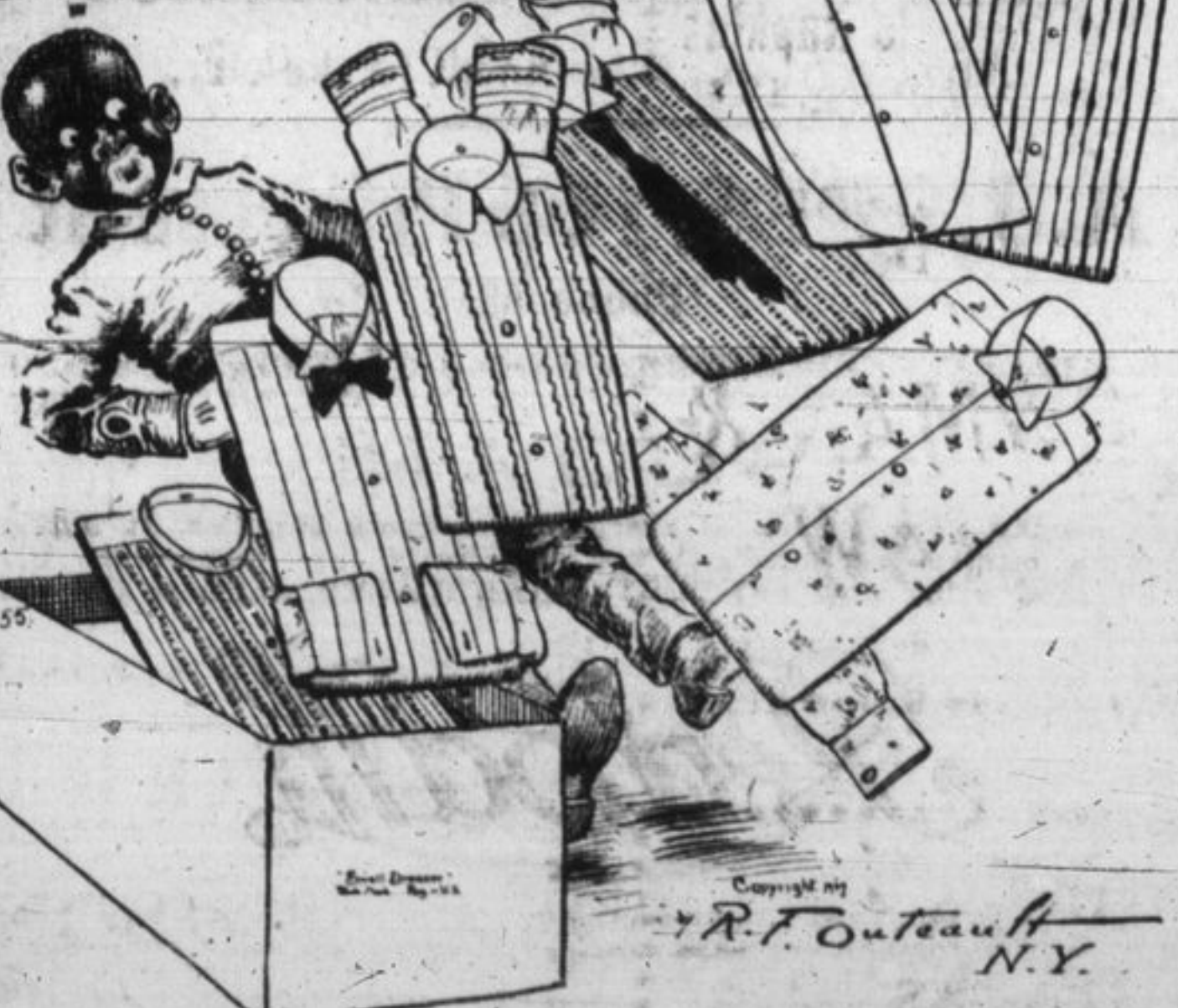

GOSSIP AT CITY HALL

SOME OF THE NEEDS OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

There Appears to Be Some Trouble in Securing Good Horses—The Plans for the New Dome.

A meeting of the Fire and Light committee was called for yesterday afternoon, but as there was no quorum, business could not be proceeded with. The chairman, Ald. Rigney, Ald. Nettle and Ald. Robertson, were the only members of the committee to put in an appearance. Ald. Hoag and Ald. Henderson are both out of the city. Several matters pertaining to the equipment of the fire department were brought before the members of the committee for action, but the only way open for the members was to talk over matters informally, and this was done. As a rule, it is always a very difficult matter to secure a quorum for civic committees during the summer months. Of course this difficulty is experienced frequently at other times, but not as often as in the summer. Yesterday, a meeting of the Board of Health had to be called off, owing to the fact that there was no quorum.

The fire department is in need of a couple of horses, about 500 feet of hose, and even a new engine has been suggested. About 150 feet of hose was destroyed at the recent city hall fire. The horse question is one that has had the attention of the members of the committee for some time, and from the experience the members have had in endeavoring to get a suitable team for the department, it would appear as if good horses are very scarce. Of course, as is well known, any old horse will not do for a fire wagon. To pick out a horse for such work requires very careful selection, and it is very often the case, that after a careful selection has been made, the animal does not "deliver the goods," as the saying goes.

However, the members are doing their best to get a team, and it is hoped that they will succeed in their efforts. Dr. Nichol, V.S., will be asked to pass judgment on some horses that will be offered for the department.

Architect Powers is at work on plans for the new city hall dome, and it is expected that he will have his report regarding the plans, and an estimate of the cost ready for the property committee, in the course of a few days.

The members of the committee are very anxious to have the work commenced as early as possible, so that everything will be completed before the cold weather sets in.

Now that the old dome is no more, and plans for the new one are under discussion, there has been much talk should be erected. It has been pointed out that the dome should be in proportion to the size of the building, and that by no means should it be erected on the same plans as the old one, which was a great mistake. By some, at all in proportion to the size of the building.

One important point which is receiving the most careful attention of the committee is that having every precaution possible taken in regard to protection from fire, that is in the material to be used, etc.

Another point in reference to the new dome which has been brought out, is that it should be high enough so as to see over all harbor construction. Even though it should cost a penny or two we should have a dome which will be a credit to the city, remarked a taxpayer yesterday, in discussing the matter. He further stated that the city had made good in the insurance, and this was a good help.
