Warning to Miscreants.

As a warning to others who may be similarly tempted, the Postoffice De partment is spreading broadcast the story of a man who was brought to justice seven years after committing a fraud on the postal savings bank. The offender was Andre Kasak of Fort William, a Hungarian, who November, 1900, stole a savings bank pass-book of John Martan, a fellowcountryman, and proceeding to Sud-bury, fraudulently declared himself to be the depositor. By forging the name of a depositor he succeeded in obtaining a check for \$500, and also in persuading the postmaster to certify to the endorsement forged upon the check, so that he was able to cash it. He then fled to Europe via Sault Ste. Marie and New York, and had made good his escape before the Postoffice Department learned of the theft. The amount thus fraudulently ob-

"When the natives found their master in the morning on his knees, dead, they embalmed his body as best they could, and carried it amidst the greatest perils to the shore, where it was placed in a crude coffin and brought to this country on a British battleship.
