PLEADED SISTER'S CASE.

When She Was Before Court For Drunkenness.

Ally Givens handled the scales of justice at the police court this morning in the absence of Magistrate Farrell, who is holidaying. There was but one case on the docket. Mrs. Mary Ann Bowman made her annual visit to the court on a charge of drunkenness. On Aug. 14th, 1907, she stood before the magistrate, and this morning she found herself in the same position. Mrs. Bowman formerly lived in Watertown but now resides in Barriefield. Yesterday she had a few Watertown ladies as visitors and the celebration that followed was too much for her. She has a family of five children and all of them are confined at the general hospital. Her husband is a marine fireman.

Early last evening Mrs. Bowman went out to the hospital to see her children but while in the institution she became very disorderly, and would not leave when requested to do so. A call was sent to the police station and she was taken to the lock-up by Constables Hughes and Davies. "It's just a year ago to-day since I was here," said Mrs. Bowman to the acting magistrate.

"And how many times have you been here?" "This is the third time."

A brother of the unfortunate woman was in court and he pleaded her case.

"Will you please give her a chance, sir," he said; "she has her family to care for. Please do it for the sake of her children."

The plea melted the heart of the acting magistrate and he dismissed the case.

STOPPED A PLOT.

Geneva, Aug. 14.—What the police claim was a well developed plot to assassinate King Edward and Emperor Francis Joseph as the two monarchs conferred together, at Ischl, on Wednesday, was frustrated by the arrest of two notorious anarchists at the railway station, at Langen, on the Swiss frontier, after a rigid searching by the police during which the anarchists outwitted the officers. They were sent back.

DEATH OF JOHN MARSHALL.

He Had Long Been in Military Service.

A very sudden death occurred at the Hotel Dieu, on Friday morning, when John Marshall passed away after a few hours' illness. He was around in his usual good health until Thursday evening, when he was taken suddenly ill and was removed to the Hotel Dieu, where, despite all that medical aid could do, he passed away, death being due to paralysis of the bowels. The late Mr. Marshall was well-known in the city, where he had lived nearly all his life. For twenty years he was a member of "A" Battery. He received his long service medal before he left the service, eighteen years ago.

Three daughters, Miss Mary Louise, Toronto; Mrs. H. Fawcett, Ottawa; Mrs. R. Ash, New York; and two sons, Charles, in the British navy and George, a member of the battery, now in Petawawa, are left to mourn. The deceased was a member of St. Mary's cathedral. The funeral will be held from his daughter-in-law's residence, Mrs. George Marshall, 21 Place d'Armes street.
