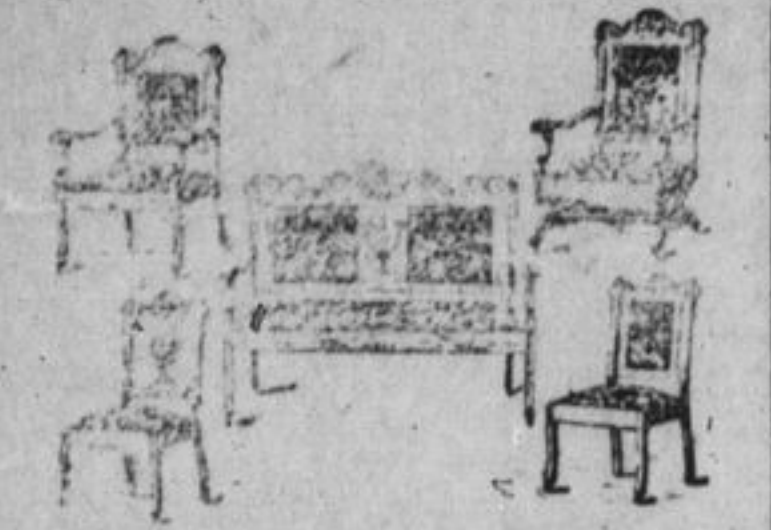

## DID NOT MATERIALIZE

### MEETING CALLED OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

Busy Week For Meetings, But Little Business Has Been Done—Another Meeting Booked For Monday.

The meeting of the board of health, called for yesterday afternoon, did not materialize. It was the same old story—no quorum. Dr. Evans, Dr. Etherington and John Lemmon were the only members who put in an appearance. The meeting was called for four o'clock, and the members who were on hand to tackle the business, waited until 4:30, and as there was not a quorum present then, they departed.

The all-important question before the board now, is that of the honorarium of \$300 suggested for Dr. Bell, the medical health officer, for his attendance at the isolation hospital, and which brought about such a lively tilt at Thursday's meeting, when the session came to a rather sudden end.

The hour of health is composed of the following: S. S. Corbett (chairman), Mayor Ross, Dr. Etherington, Dr. Evans, Dr. Knight, John Lemmon and Francis King.

Speaking to the members who were present, Dr. Evans stated that there were three additional raises in the isolation hospital, and that the board should meet to make the necessary arrangements for the care of these patients. He considered that they were shirking their duty, by staying away from the meeting. Mr. Lemmon said that business should be proceeded with.

Still another meeting has been booked for Monday afternoon, at four o'clock, and it remains to be seen if the members will put in an appearance.

This is three meetings of the board of health called for this week. At the first there was no quorum, the second came to a sudden end over the ruling of the chairman against Dr. Evans, and the third also suffered for the want of a quorum.

Dr. Evans states that he will move for a meeting of the board to be called for every day until the members turn out. He will do this for a month, if it is necessary.

### BAD BOY WAS CAUGHT

And Taken in Charge For Disorderly Conduct.

Boys will be boys. At a Bagot street home early last night, the members of a household were startled when a score or more apples were pelted through the front door. The man of the house gave chase, and succeeded in catching one of the guilty parties, a lad about fifteen years of age. A number of lads were in the party, but the citizen was unable to hold any of the others. This one lad was rather slow in making his escape. The angry citizen took him in charge, and walked him over to the police station and lodged a complaint against him.

"It wasn't me that fired the apples; it was another fellow," said the lad on the way to the lockup. Of course it is always the "other fellow" who does the damage.

However, the lad's excuse did not go. The accused was given a severe lecture by the chief, and was then allowed to proceed to his home, as the citizen did not want to make a charge against him in police court. All he desired was to make an example of one of the youngsters.

The citizen stated that the case was made all the more serious because of the fact that the youngest member of his family, a baby in arms, was very ill, and almost on the point of death. As a result, the family had been given quite a scare when the attack was made on the household. He also stated that the boys had been causing considerable trouble by their pranks, around his house of late. The police will keep an eye on this particular neighborhood, and a warm time is now in store for the youngsters who misbehave.

### Was A Runaway.

On Friday afternoon, about five o'clock a serious runaway took place on Ontario street. A cab, containing three ladies and two children, was standing at the corner of Ontario and Johnson streets, when the horses became frightened and dashed down the street. They ran as far as Brook street before they were finally got under control. Fortunately no one was seriously injured. One of the ladies fainted from fright, but the horses were stopped and Dr. Kilborn was called to attend her. She soon recovered and was sent home in another hack. The runaway drew a large crowd from all parts of the city.

Repairs to the bridge has advanced so that the company intend running their first train over it this evening.

### DID FINE WORK.

In the Release of the Steamer Wahcondah.

The steamer Donnelly returned, yesterday, after releasing the SS. Wahcondah, from Farran's Point, where she went ashore last Sunday afternoon.

This is the most treacherous spot in the river. The steamer took a shear and was driven out seven feet forward. The steamer Donnelly arrived at the wreck Monday afternoon and 18,000 bushels of grain were put into the lighter Grantham, and 7,000 bushels into the barge Dorchester. 200 feet of one and one-half inch steel hawsers were fastened on the shore to windward of the Wahcondah, and wire purchases were rigged up to it, and with the assistance of the steamer Donnelly, after very hard pulling, the steamer was released six o'clock Wednesday evening. As was not leaking she proceeded to Montreal.

The Grantham and Dorchester also took their loadage to Montreal. This is one of the best wrecking jobs that has been done on the river and reflects credit on John Donnelly, of the Donnelly Salvage and Wrecking company, who had charge of the wrecking. Capt. G.H. Montreal, represented the owners and underwriters on the steamer.
