

PROGRESS IN DUST PREVENTION. The thousands of experiments for the suppression of dust on macadam oads which have been made all over country during the past five years, have now developed a vast amount of data on the subject, which is summarized in Municipal Engineer-

"All kinds of promising compounds which make the dust sticky or heavy have been tried. Sometimes they have been of a character that would permit of their being dissolved in water and used from an ordinary sprinkling Kingston press became a profescart, giving to the water a soapy or sticky character to delay evaporation. "Several of these liquids have de monstrated their ability to keep the road dustless for a short period. None of them aim to, or have succeeded in

It has been found that tar could be used to make the mosaic waterproof: A tar compound is applied to the road in a liquid condition and hardens among the fine interstices of the roadway somewhat like cement in concrete It is absolutely waterproof and a road so treated will shed water like the proverbial duck's back. In fact, if the road happens to be imperfectly drained so as to leave puddles after rain, the water in the puddles will not be absorbed by the road and will only disappear, by evaporation.

A single treatment will give good results for a year, and will frequently show good effect much longer. Sprink ling is unnecessary and an occasiona cleaning is the only care required. A treatment for such roads cost

about \$300 per mile, and calls for no apparatus except an ordinary sprinkling cart with a special adjustable It is pretty well established that the

Thousands of lawabiding citizens who stand firmly for a proper enforcement of the license of government spies hired to tempt to the violation of the law and to profit thereby. They do not see the necessity for resort to such means. A few days ago it was announced that another salaried inspector of ho tels was to be appointed to do part of the work which the present inspec tors are paid to do. That should leave them still more time to see to the liquor law's enforcement. The li cense law is but one of the general laws of the province, and every po liceman, detective and constable is as much obligated to that law's enforcement as to any other statute. WORLD SEARCH OVER. A Stolen Necklace Recovered By

Berlin, Aug. 15 .- After being hidden or more than five months beneath the ledge of a window in her own house-a few feet above the pavement where any pedestrian might have taken it-the Countess von Wartensleben's famous \$65,000 necklace of pear's, which had been missing since February 13th, and which has been the object of a world-wide search, was recovered in the early hours of yester-

day morning The hiding place was revealed the result of a clever trap laid the housemaid, who is accused of having stolen and secreted the jewels. The alleged thief is a young married woman named Steger, formerly the countess' maid, who was arrested immediately after the pearls were missed but was later released. She has been re-arrested and says that she had not intended to steal the pearls, but merev to distress the countess by hiding An attractive summer evening frock them as an act of revenge for ill-

The ruse which finally led to the recovery of the pearls was planned by the countess' lawyer, in connection with a suit she instituted against a local periodical for insinuating that she knew more of the identity of the thief than she was willing to confess.
