

Montreal has established a new rate for handling rail-carried grain, which will reduce the transhipment price by more than three-quarters of a cent per bushel. The old rate is almost in two. The new rate was brought about by the Montreal harbor commissioners at the request of the Montreal Corn Exchange, in shape of an amendment to a by-law. This was listed as approved in Official Gazette, at Ottawa, and went into force immediately on

"The effect of the new regulations governing f.o.b, charges on export grain in the port of Montreal is to reduce those charges from one to fivetenths of a cent per bushel," explained Major Stephens, president of the harbor commissioners. This concerns export grain brought to the port by rail only, and is tarried out to meet the prevailing terminal charges for similar service at New York, Philadelphia and B ston
