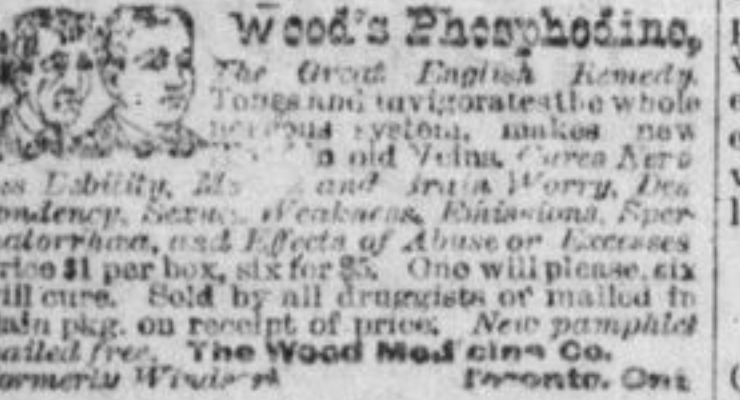

IT HAS COST \$1,400 TO LOOK AFTER THE CONTAGIOUS CASES.

In the Isolation Hospital—Some Bills Questioned—The Power Given the Board of Health.

For some time past there has been a lot of talk about the cost of maintaining the patients at the isolation hospital. In June, the mayor was not satisfied with the make-up of several accounts in connection with supplies to the hospital, and called a special meeting of the Board of Health to reconsider them. Wonder was expressed that so much money was expended for tobacco for instance. The medical health officer had passed the bills, however, and the board could do nothing else but order their payment. Since then, however, less tobacco items appear in the provision accounts.

To date, the isolation hospital patients have cost the city \$1,400. Fourteen or fifteen patients have been looked after, so that each one has cost the city about \$100. There are now three new patients in the hospital, so that the city has to continue to defray more cost of maintenance. The Board of Health has appointed a committee to attend to these and future cases.

The largest of the bills for groceries and provisions have been these: Charles Saunders, 887 1/2, M. Purcell, 839 1/2, W. J. Lavin, 818, 88. The latter was for provisions from May 11th to August 1st. A recent bill that caused comment was that of James Mallon for coal and wood supply. In one month, from May 11th to June 11th, wood and coal cost \$21.10. On May 23rd and 30th, two half cords of soft wood were purchased. A member of the Board of Health wonders if the first half cord was used up in three days. The constables have cost about \$225 so far.

Attention has been drawn to the clause on a Board of Health to spend money. The following is the clause in the act:

"The treasurer of the municipality shall forthwith, upon demand, pay out of any moneys of the municipality in his hands the amount of any order given by the members of the local board of health for any work to be performed under their direction, of the nature of the act."

If new cases continue to be found, the city treasury will soon be empty. The city council can ill-afford this year to hand out \$2,000 for any purpose not authorized, but it must pay and protect the people. It will be necessary, however, for the Board of Health to economize in every way possible, but not to the detriment of the patients, who must receive every care.

LETTERS GIVE A CLUE.
HARRY DENNY DROWNED AT CHARLOTTE HARBOR.

Watertown Girl Says Her Lover Took Job on Boat "Just For a Lark"—If Money Can Be Raised Body Will Be Secured.

"Harry Denny, on whose body letters signed by you were found, was drowned yesterday afternoon. Please inform us of his relatives."

This telegram from the corner of Rochester plunged the pretty Blanche Durand in grief this morning. She left her work and went out relatives, the city to find the relatives of the boy for whom she cared and from whom she had been parted not quite two weeks.

"It was just for a lark," he told her, that he was going to get a job on the boat and soon he would be back again. But now the news of his death has come and it will be his dead body that she will receive to-morrow.

There was only the boy's old grandfather, George J. Denny, of 30 Public Square, and his cousin, George Norris, of 111 Phelps street, that they could find. They were the only relatives of her lover.

Blanche then went back to her work, though her heart ached at the thought of the man whom she called her best friend, and whose relatives, she thought, were the only ones who would go out to try and raise funds among their friends to bring the boy's body back for burial. If they succeed it will be brought here to-morrow morning. It will come in a rough box and it will be a poor sort of funeral at best, for they can afford no more.

Harry was employed as a deck hand on the steamer Caspian. Yesterday afternoon, as the boat was in Charlotte harbor, he fell from a staging about the boat into the water, and was drowned.

Denny was not known by members of the Caspian's crew. He was at Alexandria Bay a few days ago and when the Caspian called there he was employed as a deck hand.

The Caspian reached Charlotte yesterday morning. A staging had been let down on one side of the boat in order that men might make repairs to the hull and clean it. Denny was working on the staging about three when he fell into the water. Whether he struck his head in falling is not known. Five blasts from the steamer's whistle were immediately put out from Summersville. Denny had gone down for the last time when the crew reached the Caspian. The men dragged for about an hour and recovered the body.

Young Denny had last been employed on some construction work on Winthrop street. Previous to that he had worked at the brake shop. Both his father and mother are dead. Miss Durand said she understood that the mother had met death by drowning in Black river some time ago. Until he decided to go to work on the river he had lived in the Earl house in the S. R. Ryan building. He had also worked at 637 Lillian street and at 451 Division street.

Miss Durand is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Durand, of 1150 Dewey street.

Thief Snatched Her Purse.
A Kingston lady had quite an experience on her way from Syracuse to her home here, the early part of the week, one that she will remember for some time as she was put to quite a little inconvenience by a sneak thief. When her train arrived at Watertown she stepped out to take the train for Cape Vincent. She had her ticket, trunk, check and quite a sum of money in a hand bag. While walking down the platform a man ran up behind her and snatched her purse, disappeared in the crowd and made good his escape. The young lady was in a predicament over the loss of her purse. Her parents here were telephoned to and money was at once telegraphed over to bring her home. No trace has been found of the thief by the Watertown police.
