There are 240 lady students registered at Queen's, of whom 162 are in attendance.

It cost Queen's university \$7,205.73 to finance the Faculty of Education last session. The Ontario government grant of \$5,000 was \$2,205.73 short.

It cost \$89,500.27 to maintain Queen's University last session. There was a surplus of \$64.12, including some equipment of cost \$73,437.51 to maintain the School of Mining, which had a deficit of \$821.30.

Gananoque, Aug. 19.—Gananoque's big day of aquatic sports was brought to a most successful issue yesterday, the committee in charge of the affair, consisting of Frederick J. Skinner, chairman, J. E.
