The Yukon council, after three sitings, passed the resolution with reference to the Rev. John Pringle, regarding his course in publishing libelious and slanderous articles throughout Canada with respect to the morals of Yukon territory, and particularly Dawson. As an evidence that this resolution did not emanate from either the Liberal or Conservative party it is most significant that it was introduced into the Council by Dr. Lachapelle, Conservative member for North Dawson, and seconded by John Grant, Liberal member for South Dawson, The resolution in question was the

subject of a lengthy debate in the house covering the greater part of two days, and has likewise been the subject of much comment on the streets since its hrst appearance and the subsequent adoption: The resolution is as follows: Whereas, from addresses and letters of the Rey, John Pringle reported and published very extensively in the press of Canada, it appears that Mr. Pringle has most zealously endeavored to create the impression that the Yukon territory, and particularly Dawson, are altogether given over to vice and immortality; And whereas there has been made public a telegram sent by the Commissioner of the Yukon territory to the Minister of the Interior of Canada, in which he states that he unhesitatingly affirms that

moral as any other part of Canada: Therefore, be it enacted that this Council expresses in the strongest terms its regret that Mr. Pringle should have entered upon a deliberate campaign of exaggerated calumny and slander, and should now be so industriously engaged in vilifying those with whom he lately associated in pretending amity and esteem, and from whom he has received for ten years past support, maintenance and comfort; be it further resolved, That this council expresses its approregard for morality and observance of religious conventions decencies and
