THE 5 P.M. EDITION HELD AT WATERTOWN

EDWARD RANDALL TAKEN IN CHARGE.

On a Charge of Attempting to Pass Fraudulent Money Order—Is Also Wanted at Stratcona.

Chief Graham, Napanee, went over to Watertown, N.Y., on Friday, to take in charge Edward Randall, who was arrested on a charge of passing a fraudulent express money order, made out on a Dominion Express company blank for \$20, on Max Solomon, a Watertown clothier.

The Watertown Standard, in referring to the case, states that Randall, who has a wooden leg, is twenty-seven years of age, and was recently employed in the Stratcona office of the Bay of Quinte railway, five miles from Napanee. The story given is that Randall went to Mr. Solomon's store and purchased a suit of clothes in payment for which he gave it alleged to be the express order and received some change back. Then he went away and Mr. Solomon deposited the order in the bank. Randall went to the Salvation Army headquarters and upon thinking the matter over was filled with remorse and decided to call on the commander of the army. The police were notified and Randall gave himself up and also returned the suit of clothes to Mr. Solomon, settling the transaction with him and telling him of the bogus money order. When searched at the police station a pay envelope marked for C. E. Lake for \$27.65, which Randall claims was given to him to give to Lake, was found on his person and also a book of blank orders of the Dominion Express company. Several orders in the book had been filled out, the stubs remaining, showing to whom they were made and for what amounts. These were not in Randall's handwriting and it is not supposed that he filled out more than one, the last one for which the stub was blank.

The book he admitted he had no right to. He said that he left Stratcona last Monday night with some money belonging to Lake and some other money taken from the office in which he worked. He then went to Kingston and from there to Cape Vincent, coming directly to Watertown.

SHOULD BE AUDITED

WILL ASK BOARD OF HEALTH TO ORDER IT.

The Discussion of the Matter Will Likely Result in Good—Ward Of Everything Looking Like Secrecy.

In speaking to a representative of the Whig Mr. Evans had the following to say regarding the auditing of the accounts of the board of health: "I am somewhat surprised to learn that any attempt has been made to prevent J. W. Miller auditing the accounts of the local board of health. I think all bills should go to the city auditor before coming to the board for payment. At the meetings it is impossible for individual members to go through a multitude of grocery bills and pass safely on every item. This could be done by the auditor, and as a protection to both board and city ought to be done. I can assure you that I will introduce a motion at the next meeting of the board ordering every bill to be first passed by Auditor Miller before being presented for payment. This will have the effect of checking all accounts without hampering the board in the least in carrying out the privileges conferred upon it by the health act."

"I do not claim extraordinary privileges for the board of health more than any other city department and I am sure the excellent material now in the board will heartily concur with any movement made towards safeguarding the city's finances and relieving themselves of even the suspicion of carelessness or recklessness. This is one of the happy results of open criticism and fair discussion of public questions."
