FIGHT TO A FINISH

STRIKERS ARE PEACEFUL "BREAKERS" GET COCKY.

Several of the latter turned over to the police for displaying weapons.

Winnipeg, Aug. 24.—The strike situation is practically unchanged, the company apparently being determined to fight to a finish, although unable to make schedule time with passenger trains, in many cases losing one to two hours on 50-mile runs, said J. H. McVey.

A determined effort is being made at several western points by detectives and thugs to create trouble by discharging firearms during dark hours and attempting to throw blame on the strikers. The peaceful policy of the strikers is causing the strike-breakers to become arrogant and insulting, and strikers have turned several over to the city police for attempting to use firearms.

The men are confident of victory, but deplore the weak policy of the government in allowing the imposition of the large number of alien undesirable, in direct contravention of the alien labor law. "The press," added Mr. McVey, "should warn harvesters against wasting money coming west, as many are already returning, being unable to procure employment."
