**NEW YORK STOCK MARKET.**  
 Quick Swings Up and Down in Values.  
 New York, Aug. 24.—The cotton market overabundant all else in New York week. There was a desperate battle between bulls and bears. J. L. Livermore, recognized successor to Daniel J. Sully, was attacked by professional traders and received a severe drubbing. According to gossip his party were long 3,000 bales. They were forced to liquidate and the experts on the Exchange figure that they lost a cent a pound, which netted them a loss of one million and a half dollars. According to Livermore's friends he made enough money on the short side of other stocks to cover all losses in cotton. On Thursday when October cotton broke \$3 a bale, Mr. Livermore left his office in the middle of the day and went aboard his yacht and remained there until mid-day Friday. His actions were not those of a heavy loser. All eyes are still on the cotton market.

Trading on the New York Stock Exchange and the Consolidated Exchange was active and irregular, half the members being bulls and the other members bears. The market made quick swings up and down. Near the end of the week, when Southern Pacific crossed par, the highest price recorded for that issue, the market looked for a time as if the bulls had once more gained control. Prices were then attacked by the Rock Island crowd and San Francisco preferred and Rock Island preferred broke four points. New York Central was also very weak on its reports; a large floating indebtedness, heavy expenses and not earning dividends. Reports from business centres were much better. The United States Steel Corporation reported that the new business was large for July than the aggregate of steel produced.
