THE OLD, OLD STORY

Of a Man Abusing His Wife While Drunk.

The old, old story of a man abusing his wife, while in his cups, was tried in the police court this morning, when Robert Heath, laborer, was arraigned before Acting Magistrate Givens, on a charge of drunkenness. Trembling and clinging to the railing of the prisoner's dock, and showing every evidence of being on a long spree, Heath pleaded guilty to the charge lodged against him. "Is this a habit of yours?" asked the court. "Not of late," was the reply, "and if you give me a chance I will see that it does not occur again." The magistrate then turned to Mrs. Heath, who was in court, and heard the other side of the story. With tears in her eyes Mrs. Heath told the court that her husband always supported her when he was sober, but when he was drinking he used violence towards her. He had been drinking very heavily during the past year. "But this will never occur again," broke in the accused. "I wish I had the power to give such as you the lash or the cat-o-nine tails," said the acting magistrate. "I am sure it would not happen again then." Heath promised to give up whiskey, however, and not to abuse his wife, and he was given a chance. Heath thanked the court for the chance.

POSTMASTER ENRAGED.

At a Man Who Drilled a Hole in the Building.

When Postmaster James Stewart arrived back at his office early this afternoon he found a man busy drilling a hole in one of the base stones of the building on Carleton street. He at once ordered him to desist as the man was ruining the stone. When asked what authority he had for acting as he was doing the stranger said he was from the marine department at Ottawa and was taking lake levels. Postmaster Stewart threatened to have him arrested if he can't leave at once, and the man did as ordered, but he practically spoiled the stone, which will have to be filled with cement. He informed the postmaster that he would show him later that he had the right to drill the holes. The postmaster declared that he wasn't going to be defaced for any lake levels and that a man should have more sense than to pick upon one of the finest cut stones in the whole building. An old wall alongside would answer the purpose as well. Mr. Stewart immediately reported the matter to Government architect A. F. Ellis, who has charge of the local government buildings. The postmaster's friends say that it was an anarchist he met and that the post office is surely going to be blown up to-night.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 25.—Eighteen men are reported killed and a number injured in the collapse of a brick block in Chelsea Square, at 10:35 o'clock to-day. Ten dead and seven badly hurt have already been taken out. Seven men are still buried in the ruins.

Cause of Attack.

Aberdeen, S. D., Aug. 25.—Revenge for the arrest of several suspected horse thieves is believed to be the cause of the attempt to destroy the towns of Howry and Akaska, by night riders, early this morning. Both towns narrowly escaped being wiped out.

HIS FINGER PRINTS

Identified Him As An English Pickpocket.

Toronto, Aug. 25.—Some time ago a man, giving the name of James Jenkins, was arrested in Ottawa, on a charge of picking pockets. The police there inquired of the Toronto police for any particulars that would lead to his identification. The Toronto police had a description and the finger prints of the man, who had served a sentence here, to the police authorities at London, Eng., who, to-day, notified them that they had recognized the finger prints and general description as those of a man who has served sixteen sentences in Britain for picking pockets. They wired the Ottawa police to this effect.

A VIOLENT EXPLOSION.

An Enemy Barrel Caused Some Astonishment.

Toronto, Aug. 25.—Blas Shero, a young Spaniard, employed in a cigar factory, while on his way to work, this morning, dropped a match with which he had lit his cigar into the binghole of one of the barrels at Harbinger's company, limited, and a load of empty, but it formerly contained black Japanese varnish, and in a moment there was a violent explosion. The barrel blew out and part of it buckshot lodged in the young man's hip and inflicted a deep cut in his chin. Blas had to be taken to the hospital for attention.

Killed By His Son.

Jacksonville, Fla., Aug. 25.—A farmer named Turner, living near here, was shot and killed, last night, by his son. Bad blood had existed for some time, because it is alleged the younger Turner was in love with his stepmother, a young girl whom his father had married a short time ago.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT.

Gun Discharged While They Were ear Hunting. Vancouver, Aug. 25.—Harry Brown, twenty-eight, engineer at the Vancouver Power company's plant at Lake Buntzen, twenty miles from Vancouver, was fatally shot late Saturday afternoon while bear hunting.

With a companion named Hamshaw, Brown left the power-house on the North Arm Burrard Inlet. He saw a bear twenty yards away. Brown climbed up a cliff, cocking his gun as he ran. He was just ready to shoot when he slipped and fell backward. His gun discharged and a load of buckshot lodged in his right arm and breast. Hamshaw carried him to the boat, and they reached Vancouver at midnight. Brown died of shock and loss of blood.

SUN KILLED FATHER.

Had Beaten Wife and Daughter—Body in Trunk.

Baltimore, Md., Aug. 25.—According to the detective authorities of this city, Mrs. Bonnie Rosenbloom and her daughter, Eva, confessed that the body found in the trunk at Bellevue Mawr, near Camden, N.J., on August 16th, was that of Samuel J. Rosenbloom of Windler, Pa., husband of the elder woman; and that he was killed by her son, Alexander Rosenbloom, at their home in Windler, Pa., last November. The woman said her husband had been fatally wounded because he had beaten them.

A School Teacher Busy.

Hot Springs, Ark., Aug. 25.—Henry Fisher, aged fifty years, a prominent farmer of Lincoln township, this county, was cut and fatally wounded, yesterday, by Garfield Lewis, a school teacher, who is alleged to have punished the boy and quarrelled with the boy's father, who went to the school to investigate.

Confessed To Murder.

Chicago, Aug. 25.—Frank Bryant was arrested in Chicago, yesterday, and he confessed he murdered Thomas Brady, an aged clerk, on Sunday night, in Springfield, Ill.
