STRONG MEN OF THE DAY.

The Asquith government is displaying a courage and consistency of purpose which is very remarkable to say the least of it. It cannot be held that it is trucking to public opinion, or the lower forms of political influence. There was a suggestion of that when the Old Age Pension Bill was pushed through, with a second passage without the amendments of the House of Lords.

There was some show of courting public favor when the Education Bill was launched, though it was a fulfillment of anti-election promises and the dissident vote was very strong; but the Licensing Bill was surely an unpopular measure, as it provoked the assaults of the brewers and the beer drinkers, and yet the premier, firmly convinced that there was a need for it, held to his purpose and carried the measure with his usual majority.

Now he has given assurance of another disturbing bill, that for the disestablishment of the Welsh church. It is not a new proposition. Mr. Gladstone dealt with it earnestly but unsuccessfully. The Welsh people are clamorous for action, and Mr. Asquith, the strong man of the day, has agreed to serve them. Here is the prospect of further trouble for or from the House of Lords, but the premier does not shrink from his task on that account.

The Toronto News declares that "continually the license holders evade the provisions of the act by selling after hours and on Sunday," that "in some hotels the serving of whiskey in tea cups in the cafes is resorted to." And all this was to stop under conservative rule.

THE PEOPLE'S LOW IDEALS.

There is one challenge of a contemporary which reflects attention, the remark that the liberal party in the province of Ontario suffered through the poor ideals of its leaders. To buttress this argument some questionable proceedings in certain local elections are quoted.

But there is another side to the issue. The people, irrespective of party, are primarily responsible for the corruption that prevails in any election, for they are surely susceptible to evil influences, or what a contemporary has termed "bedevilment." The people get what they want, and when one reads the record of the Colchester election he realizes the force of this contention. Here is a constituency which had an honorable history, which was regarded as soundly liberal and the conversion of which to common conservatism and by common means was apparently impossible.

An expert in political methods, or an expert manipulator of men by corrupt means, finds a lodgment among the electors, and with the lavish use of whiskey and money manages to demoralize the electors. The experience in Colchester was a duplication of the experience in London. Liberals, more shame to them, took the bribes, refraining from voting when they did not vote against the dictates of their consciences. They may be ashamed of themselves now, though the evidence of this is not very clear.

The hypocrisy of the men who profited by this sort of thing, this flagrant, inexcusable and outrageous abandonment to degrading practices, is glaring in the extreme. There never was a worse exhibition of political profligacy than that of Colchester, and the Halifax Herald says of it: "The clean, straight main liberals of Colchester have spoken loud and clear. They set the seal of their stern condemnation on the immorality; the debauchery and the corruption of the men masquerading as liberals."

Who is to blame most for the turpitude of the times, the people or the leaders of the people? The general answer may be, "the leaders." They should, of course, be high-minded, above reproach, men of principle and purpose, men who will not stoop to mean things on any account. Yet the people should be superior to any petty bribery and especially to the dopping of whiskey. The exercise of the franchise is regarded as a sacred trust, and the ballot as the expression of a public opinion which should be influenced by any sordid feeling. That both franchise and ballot are, however, marketable and corrupt is something which Canada should deeply deplore.

The circulation of millions, which must be spent on wheat and the transportation of it across the continent, must revive business. The soil after all is the greatest source of our riches.

The sudden and continued coolness has injured the boating business. And the season is about to close.

The Halifax Herald (conservative), laments that its party did not uncover and repudiate the debauchery in Colchester. The party which commits a crime is so anxious generally for exposure!

Some gifted and great men are passing away. Are their places being taken by others? That is the theory, but these are not identified. The world has not, it is true, lacked at any time for talent.

The dome of the city hall does not present as picturesque an appearance that it should be left, as it is any longer than possible. The committee must hustle if there is to be a new dome before winter.
