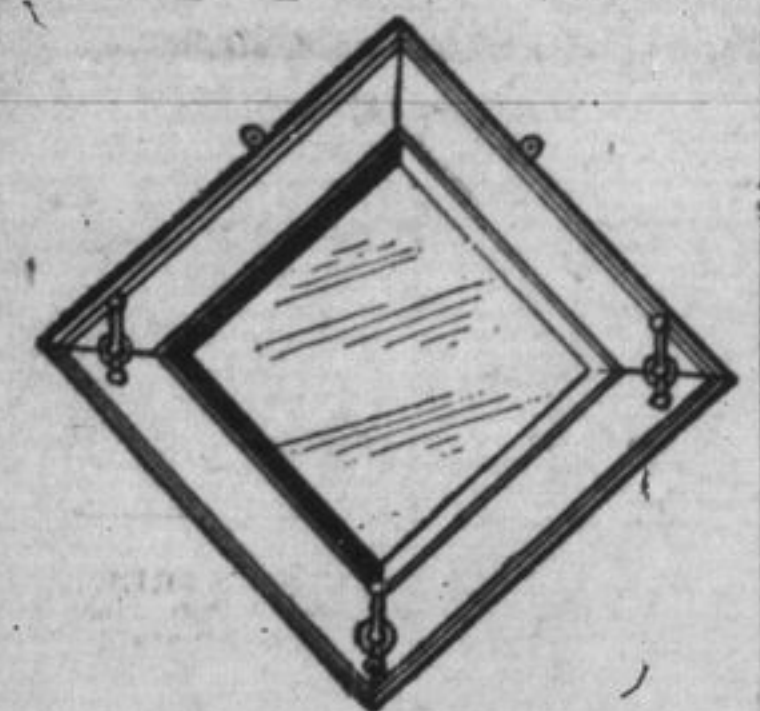

DEAT GANANOQUE KINGSTON TEAM WON THE LACROSSE MATCH.

The Score Was 7 to 1—"Jack" Williams Will Remain With the Ottawa Rugby Team—General Notes on Various Sports.
The Kingston lacrosse club added another victory to its list, on Thursday afternoon, when it went to Gananoque and put it over the home team by seven goals to one. The Gananoque team was defeated here eight goals to two, early in the summer, but has improved a great deal since then, and has now quite a fast team. Gananoque played a good fast game on Thursday, but was not able to get near the nets, so strong was the visiting team. The game was played in the fair grounds, at St. John's Roman Catholic church picnic, before about seven hundred people.

The visiting team had things pretty much their own way from the start and the players did not have to exert themselves to any extent, but when the occasion demanded that they do so, they were always capable. Gananoque has a good bunch of players, who understand the game. Three or four of the old-time bunch were out at the game—Cliff Gardner, O'Connell and Shields. They were good players about eight years ago, when they lost the championship to Watertown, but now they are a little behind. The old style of backward throw, over the head, picking the ball and throwing it wildly about the field, seems to have gone out of date, but it was continually used on Thursday. Once or twice the game became a little strenuous, and the spectators rushed on the field, but no very serious teams were dealt out to anybody. The game lined up as follows:

Third quarter—Gananoque, O'Connor, 2 mins.; Kingston, McIntyre, 4 mins. Fourth quarter—Kingston, Cousins, 3 mins.; Kingston, Nicholson, 3 mins.; Kingston, Cousins, 2 mins. Penalties—Lullow and Shields, three minutes in last quarter.

T. M. Stockdale made most satisfactory play. In the first quarter Kingston scored two goals. Cousins sending the first on McIntyre's pass, and also landing the second on Craig's throw in. The Kingston team seemed to have the home team guessing the first half, but as soon as they landed two or three goals they loosened up and did not hang on to the rubber all the time. In the second quarter Gananoque tried to land a few but failed, the old timers working hard to get it in the nets, but Boyd was always in the way. Only one goal was scored this quarter, Cousins again finding the net. In the third quarter, near the end of it, a mighty cheer arose, one that could be heard down in the business part of the city, about two miles away. The occasion for the noise was the fact that Michael O'Connor, the veteran player found the nets for Gananoque. One minute later Cousins landed another to even up. In the last quarter three goals were landed by the visitors, making the score seven to one. The visitors were treated very well during their stay in the town by the team and people.

To Play With Ottawa.
"Jack" Williams is not going to play football at Queen's this year, but, instead, will return to the capital and again figure on the back division of the Ottawa fourteen in the Interprovincial League. Reports from Kingston recently would lead one to believe that Williams was going back to Queen's. These were incorrect, however, for Williams has been spending his vacation with relatives at Peak's Island, near Portland, Maine, and would have been back in Ottawa a month ago had he not met with an accident. "Jack," who is captain of the O.A.C.C. ball team in the City Baseball League this year, was playing for the Peak's Island nine against Portland about four weeks ago, and in sliding to the home place, fell heavily and knocked his right shoulder out of joint. The injury was a painful one and Williams was laid up for three weeks. He is just getting around again, and is expected back in Ottawa in a few days.

All the Other Offices Filled at Session on Thursday Afternoon—The Closing Meeting.
The high court of Foresters resumed its session again at two o'clock, Thursday afternoon. The principal business of the afternoon was the election of officers for the ensuing year. Bro. Dr. Wade, of Cobourg, has filled the office of high chief ranger with great acceptability and success, but as it has been the custom in Eastern Ontario to elect a high chief ranger of a third term, two candidates were nominated to contest with him the seat of the high chief ranger.

The nominees were: Bro. W. H. Lowery, P.H.V.C.R., Ottawa, and Dr. G. H. Wade, H.C.R., and on the second ballot Bro. Lowery was elected.

Bro. Macgillivray and Johnson retired, and on the third ballot, Bro. McKinnon was elected.

For the offices of high secretary and high treasurer, Bro. G. L. Dickinson, Manotick, and J. S. B. McCann, Kingston, were re-elected, by acclamation.

For the office of high physician, Dr. Richardson, of Kingston, Dr. Mather, of Belleville, and Dr. Hanley, high physician, were nominated and Dr. Richardson was elected on the second ballot.

For the office of high counselor, Bro. H. O. E. Pratt, of Ottawa, was elected by acclamation.

For high auditors, Bro. Rowan, of Ottawa, and Thomas Lambert, of Kingston, were re-elected.

Marose, Ottawa; H.S.R., Geo. Thaboult, Cherry Valley; H.J.B., J. W. Burgess, Peterboro; H. Mar., R. Dayman, Goodenham; H. Con. E. Kyle, Ganmore; H.M., W. S. L. Merrill, Mountain.

The high court held its concluding session on Thursday evening, at eight o'clock. The attendance was somewhat slim, as many of the members, knowing that very little business of importance remained to be transacted, had taken the evening train for home.

The first item of business was the finance committee's report, which showed that the finances were in a satisfactory condition, there being a substantial balance in the treasury in spite of the fact that the expenses of the past year have been considerably in advance of those of the preceding year.

After resolutions of thanks had been passed to the mayor and city council, to the people of Kingston for their kindness and courtesy, and to the press, for its generous reports, the officers for the ensuing year were installed, and the high court adjourned, to meet again in Smith's Falls, in August, 1909.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS. A NY emigrant seeking of Dominion Lands in the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person, male or female, of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be made by an agent on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for cancellation must be made in person by the applicant must be liable for homestead entry.

DUTIES.—(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(3) If the father (or mother, if the other is deceased) of a homesteader had permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS. COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, or for a term of 100 years, for a sum not more than \$2,500. A claim may be located on one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee \$5.00. At least \$100.00 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500.00 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

DEEDING.—Two issues of five miles each of river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10.00 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2% per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.
