REV. FATHER KEHOE HELD A GRAND PICNIC.

Cananoque, Aug. 28.—St. John's church held a most successful and largely attended picnic at the Cananoque Driving Park yesterday. Dinner was served from 11.30 a.m. till 2 p.m., after which a programme of sports, consisting of a half-mile race for boys, won by E. Cumming; a girls' race, won by Miss O'Brien; Cananoque teams, the boys from the limestone city being too much for the locals winning out by seven goals to one; a baseball match between two picked teams of local ball players, the Garnocks winning by a score of 9 to 1. Addresses were given by George Taylor, M.P., and John R. Dargavel, M.P.P. Supper was served from 5.30 till 8 p.m. A dancing platform, attended by an orchestra, furnished music throughout the afternoon, and was well patronized.

The eating part of the affair took place on the United States side of the river near Alexandria Bay and was followed by a delightful cruise back through the Canadian Channel. HAVE LITERARY TASTE. Something About Authors and Their Wives.
