### YOUNG MAN DROWNED

#### JAS. BIRMINGHAM, GANANOQUE, LOST HIS LIFE.

While in Swimming With Some Companions, Near Kingston Mills—He Was Out on a Week's Cruise.

James Birmingham, aged about twenty-seven years, living at Gananoque, was drowned at McGrath's Point near Kingston Mills, about 4:30 o'clock on Sunday afternoon. His body was not recovered until eight o'clock in the evening.

Birmingham, with three other companions, had left Gananoque in a launch, on a week's cruise. When they reached the Mills they found that they could not get through the locks until the morning, and so decided to stay there over night. The three young men went in for a swim. Birmingham took a dive and he was seen no more, and it is believed that he suffered cramps. Every effort possible was put forth to secure the body but it was not found until after grappling irons had been secured from Kingston and put to work. After three hours' search the body was recovered. The remains were brought to Kingston, taken to the undertaking parlors of James Reid & Sons, and this morning sent on to Gananoque.

Deceased was looked upon as a fine swimmer. He was well-known in Gananoque, and the news of his sad ending caused general regret. He is survived by his mother, a widow, and one sister.

The sad fatality put an end to the week's cruise of the young men, who looked forward to having a splendid outing this week.

Deceased was secretary of the Gananoque Yacht club, and was well-known in this city. The party intended putting in the time shooting down the Rideau river.

#### HOUSE WAS DESTROYED.

#### Fire at Snow Road Early Sunday Morning.

Early on Sunday morning, the house occupied by Thomas Miller and his family, at Snow Road, caught fire, and was almost totally destroyed. A portion of the household effects were saved, but the loss will be very heavy, and very little insurance is carried. The blaze broke out in the kitchen, but its origin is a mystery.

Snow Road was, just a little over a week ago, the scene of a very serious fire, when the mills of Isaac Allen caught fire, and members of the Kingston fire department were called to render assistance.

#### DIVERTING OF THE EARL STREET SEWER

#### May Be First Step Towards Intercepting Sewers—Queen Street Sewer Causing Trouble—A Civic Deficit.

The diverting of the Earl street sewer to Gore street, rendered necessary in order to allow the Locomotive works to proceed with extensions over the present sewer, will probably mark the beginning of a series of intercepting sewers here. In diverting the Earl street sewer into Gore street, a large pipe will be required on the latter thoroughfare from Ontario street to the water. This cost, it is understood, the Locomotive works company will pay. The amount required to do this work satisfactorily will be about \$3,500. What City Engineer Craig proposes to do is to make the Gore street sewer large enough to receive all the sewage from William to Union streets, and for the city to pay the extra \$1,500 necessary. Heheaters for the latter amount could be issued. The board of works has yet to consider this question.

#### Queen Street Sewer.

The Queen street sewer extension outlet, while it has improved conditions to a large extent, has not brought complete relief to the ship leased by R. Crawford & Co. Oil and grease are still noticeable on the water. It is said that one reason for this is the stirring up of the bottom of the slip. A thorough dredging might relieve that. But it is claimed that from the sewer there issue large pieces of grease and fat, from a pork factory nearby. It is not in the interest of the public health to have this continue, and the board of health may be asked to take action.

#### Will Be Big Deficit.

The city council will likely have quite a large deficit at the end of the year, in view of the extraordinary expenditure this year. The contagious disease hospital has so far cost about \$1,500, an expenditure not looked for, but at the same time most essential. If the council comes out with a deficit as low as \$3,000, it will be lucky under present conditions. It looks as though the taxes would have to be made the even twenty-one milly next year, instead of twenty milly and a half as at present. The city's requirements cannot be financed with its present revenue.

#### Tramp Takes A Swim.

A tramp, giving his name as Edward Bradley, played off dead and dumb at Calaboggy, begging by writing on a pad. At night he changed his vocation to robbery at the K. & P. railway station. He had broken panes of glass ere noticed. T. J. Murphy, village constable, was notified and arrested the man, placing him in a sample room of the hotel till morning. He then broke out through a window and jumped into the rapids and swam down the stream. A crowd ran down the shore to intercept him, but he eluded them for a time. They chased him until he last and the prisoner was taken to Renfrew for trial, where he was sentenced to three months in Pembroke jail for vagrancy. There he may be indicted for burglary. Meanwhile he had changed from a deaf mute to a voluble talker.

#### A Great Conciliator.

John G. McDonoghue, independent labor candidate, asked his opinion of Prof. Shortt's capacity of the task of reconciling the C.P.R. and its employees, said: "I have been on a number of boards with Prof. Shortt and I believe the time is about opportune for him to be called upon. I believe it would be a fitting climax to his work. He is a great conciliator, and it would not be the first time he intervened after one board had failed, which is the most difficult time to do anything. Prof. Shortt succeeded when one board failed in the case of the miners down east. If the dominion government asked him to step in, and take hold, it would answer the purpose of both parties, as neither side might like to take the first step as it might be understood as being a sign of weakness."

#### Pity Cost Him Dear.

"The quality of mercy cost a Calabogie family dear last week. A man named Box was fined \$10 for killing a deer, which, he said, came into his neighborhood with its just shot off and its leg broken. Thinking that it would die anyway, and that it would be more kind to kill it and thus put an end to its sufferings, he and his family killed the animal, and consumed it at their cottage. A friend, R. Lee, who helped to cut it, was fined \$10. The warrants were issued by Capt. Alf Hunter, of Harrowsmith, warden in charge of the eastern district. If it was a proven case of deliberate killing of the deer he would have inflicted a heavier fine."

#### TROUBLE OVER SQUEALERS ON SATURDAY.

#### THE LOCOMOTIVES DEFEATED THE IRISHMEN

#### They Were Stolen and Later Recovered From a Boat—The Thief May Have Got Frightened.

#### Team Was Organized.

There was some trouble on the market, on Saturday, over four pigs, which were brought into the city, in a crate, for sale. Early in the afternoon, the "porkers" were sold to a farmer named Francis Clay, living at Millhaven. Mr. Clay had some other business to attend to around town before leaving for home, so he went away, leaving the pigs on the market, believing that all people were honest and that they would be there when he came back. The entire police force was told to be on the lookout for four stray pigs, but it fell to the fate of Constable Filson to take the "porkers" in charge. Constable Filson had been over on Wolfe Island, and on boarding the steamer on his return trip, he learned that there was a box of pigs on board for whom no owner could be secured.

"Just keep them on board and we'll find out about them when we get to Kingston," said the young officer of the law. And the pigs came back.

Upon arrival of the boat at the wharf, it took very little time to straighten out matters. Comparing notes with the other members of the force, Constable Filson found that the pigs had been stolen, and the right owner was soon in possession of them, and sent on his way home rejoicing.

If the case was one of theft, it is quite evident that the thief suffered from "cold feet," as it were, after he had made off with his plunder, as it is not known who put the pigs on the boat.
