WHITES MAY BE DRIVEN OUT OF WEST EN FIRELY.

Alarming Statement Made By Mr. Hemphill, Who is in Winnipeg to Seek Premier Roblin's Support in Struggle For a White Canada.

Winnipeg, Aug. 29.-R. Hemphill Secretary of the Asiatic Exclusion League, is here interviewing Premier Roblin to enlist his sympathy in the strug-gle for a white Canada. "We are not asking for money," he says, "but for the moral support of the Canadian people. Everyone is with us at the coast, except the mill men and ratiway companies. There are 95 Orientals to every five white men employed in the lumber and shingle mais on the coast. The Orientals have practically driven the white men out of the canning industry. They just come to this country to get money, and then send or take it home again. They are no good to the country. It costs these Orientals twenty cents a day to live, and a white man can't live on less than \$800 a year according to the royal commission.
