Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Homestead Regulations.

ANY unoccupied section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 2 and 30, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family or male over 18 years of age to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be made in an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry.

DUTIES.—(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year, during the term of five years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence obligation by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence obligation by living with the father (or mother).

(3) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in direct line.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$100 an acre. Not more than \$100.00 a mile per annum. Royalty, 24 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee \$50.00. At least \$100.00 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$300.00 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with, the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS. Generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$50.00.

DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$100.00 a mile per annum. Royalty, 24 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.

THE YELLOW PERIL

WHITES MAY BE DRIVEN OUT OF WEST ENTIRELY.

Alarming Statement Made By Mr. Hemphill, Who is in Winnipeg to Seek Premier Roblin's Support in Struggle For a White Canada.

Winnipeg, Aug. 29.—R. Hemphill, Secretary of the Asiatic Exclusion League, is here interviewing Premier Roblin to enlist his sympathy in the struggle for a white Canada. "We are not asking for money," he says, "but for the moral support of the Canadian people. Everyone is with us at the coast, except the mill men and railway companies. There are 95 Orientals to every five white men employed in the lumber and shingle mills on the coast. The Orientals have practically driven the white men out of the logging industry. They just come to this country to get money, and then send or take it home again. They are no good to the country. If they would bring their wives and families with them and adopt the manner of living and spend their money here we would welcome them with outstretched arms.

"You've got them right here in Winnipeg. In one dive on Alexander Avenue there are seventy-nine Chinamen sleeping every night in a place that isn't fit for a dog to live in. There are 200 Orientals in Winnipeg. They are driving the white people out of British Columbia, and if they are not stopped will soon drive them out of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba. The white population of British Columbia is about 200,000, with 60,000 adult males. There are 40,000 adult Orientals, 10,000 Japs, 10,000 Chinese and 8,000 Hindoos in the province, and not more than five per cent of the number are females. Hindoos start work at eighty cents a day and Japs at ninety cents, and they work up to \$1.50. Mill men will discharge a good white man getting \$3.50 a day, and put three Japs in his place. It costs these Orientals twenty cents a day to live, and a white man can't live on less than \$200 a year according to the royal commission.

GIRL'S BODY FOUND.

Mystery of Seven Months is Partly Revealed.

Liverpool, Aug. 29.—Seven months ago a little Liverpool girl named Margaret Kirby disappeared from her home at 65 Romilly street; yesterday morning her body was found in a sack.

Two workmen who were passing up Great Newton street—saw a sack lying on the doorstep of an empty house. Being curious, they opened the sack and saw what at first looked like a dead dog. Then, looking further, they saw a child's hand, and ripping the sack completely open discovered the decomposed body of a little girl dressed only in one garment and stockings.

Great Newton street contains a number of empty houses, which are in process of demolition by the corporation, and these were exhaustively searched by the police. In the cellar of No. 15, a house which has been vacant for many months, they found the remainder of the child's clothing, which was afterwards identified by David Kirby as that worn by his daughter when she disappeared.

Rank Hypocrisy Exposed.

London, August 29.—The Liberal candidate, the conservative press would have held the Liberal government directly responsible. The disclosures would have been pointed to as fresh proof of the iniquities of the Liberal "machine." Charges of wholesale and organized corruption were brought against the Liberal party because of its capture in Nova Scotia, and the minister of finance, a man of stainless honor, has been cruelly traduced in this connection. The same process of reasoning would lay the bribery at Colchester at the door of Mr. Roblin, and the whole conservative party. There is nothing but fear of the law to prevent unscrupulous partisans in any riding from resorting to the methods which have disgraced Colchester, but this is no reason why a system of corruption should be imputed to either party, and public men maligned for offenses which they abhor and would stamp out if they could. The Colchester case is a rebuke to the rank hypocrisy of the conservative press and many conservative politicians.

Let Us Have Power.

Colborne, Ontario, Star.—Colborne wants power and we want to get that power as cheap as possible. The hydro-electric commission intend running the transmission line down the Trent as far as Colborne. The Dominion government are building the canal dams on the Trent river, which will generate a lot of power, and it should be much cheaper power than the Niagara Falls power as it is so much closer from Trenton. It stands to reason that a line of forty miles should be cheaper than one of over 200 miles. We should get power from Trenton at from \$15 to \$18, and we are informed that power from Niagara Falls is quoted at thirty dollars to Bowmanville. There should be no politics in this. Western Canada can be furnished with cheap power from Niagara Falls, but the longer the distance the greater will be the expense. If we can get power from Trenton, let us have it by all means, and as soon as we can.
