A Cut In Expenses.
Hamilton Times.
J. J. Wright, Toronto, in reply to the protestations of the hydro-electric promoters that there is no danger in an electric transmission line, unfenced, passing through farms and along the highways, points out that when the charter of the Toronto & Niagara company was granted, the company was compelled to fence its transmission line. The Toronto & Niagara company's line is of 60,000 volts, and Mr. Beck says the hydro line may be of 120,000 volts. The original plan of the commission was for a line 100 feet wide between Niagara and Hamilton, and 66 feet wide between Hamilton and Toronto, fenced on both sides and with gates and crossings. The latest proposals provide for no such protection.
