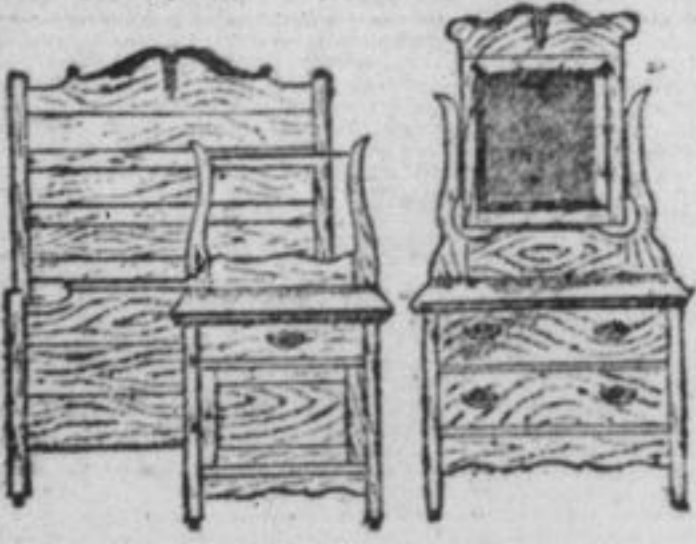

FORESTERS WORSHIP

IN ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH, SUNDAY EVENING.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Homestead Regulations.

Any even-numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 4 and 16, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Land Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be made by an Agency in certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry.

NOTES.—(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader had permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee \$3.00. At least \$100.00 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the mining recorder. Where \$500.00 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre. PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

DRAINING.—A grant of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10.00 per annum. Royalty, 2 1/2 per cent, after the output exceeds \$10,000.
