



## WIFE QUILTS HUSBAND

## MURDER AND SUICIDE END FAMILY QUARREL.

Woman's Aunt Interferes in Domestic Affairs and Brings Discord Where Peace Reigned.

Paris, Sept. 8.—The French law which makes the relatives of a wife heirs to half the property of the husband was responsible yesterday for a tragic murder and suicide in Paris.

A workingman named Barry, his wife and their 7-year-old daughter Margaret lived quite happily in Paris until an aunt of Mine, Barry informed her, was giving a weekly sum of money to his aged parents, suggested to Mine, Barry, that she act against her interests.

The wife spoke to her husband about it, and he replied quietly that his money was his own and that he had a right to do what he liked with it. He continued the pension to his parents. This was six months ago.

Mine, Barry was finally persuaded to leave her home, husband and daughter and go to live with her aunt. Then she began an action for divorce, and secured a ruling of the court permitting her to remove half the furniture in her husband's establishment.

Accompanied by a solicitor and a commissioner, Mine, Barry went to her husband's flat yesterday morning and the division began. Half way through, M. Barry asked his wife to step aside and talk to him a moment. He begged her to stop the legal proceedings and to come back and live with him.

She refused unless he would consent to stop paying out money to his father and mother. To this he would not agree, and she turned to the commissioner and, pointing to a little table, told him to carry it downstairs.

The table was Barry's first present to his wife, and as it was taken out of the room, he drew a revolver, fired, and wounded her mortally. Then he shot himself through the head.

He died on the spot.

Notices have been posted at the works, saying that the blast furnaces will resume operations on Tuesday, September 15th, and the Bessemer open hearth blowing and rail mills will start up at six o'clock on Thursday morning, October 1st.

## PITH OF THE NEWS.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over The World.

Four trainmen and five tramps were killed in a collision on the Northern Pacific.

Frank W. Fowler, Toronto, has been arrested at Boston on a charge of forgery.

It is reported that negotiations for the settlement of the C.P.R. strike are in progress.

Mayor D'Arcy Scott, Ottawa, may be appointed to the board of railway commissioners.

Father Macario Nasr, for twelve years pastor of the Syrian Catholics, in Toronto, is dead.

The Cosmopolitan bank, Pittsburgh, Pa., has closed its doors by the order of the controller of the currency.

The Ontario government is to establish fish farms in Northumberland county for the propagation of black bass.

Mexico has made the curious discovery that she has within her borders 7,679 mosquito towns that she thought she had.

C. C. Forward, Ottawa, has been appointed assistant analyst in the laboratory of the department of inland revenue.

Five thousand socialists and members of the Socialist party against Prince Arthur of Connaught at Glasgow on Saturday.

It is expected that before many days Sir Wilfrid Laurier will submit to his excellency the proposal for a dissolution of parliament.

Forrest Ross, Bayfield, Ont., was killed at Niagara Falls by an automobile in which he was riding, plunging over the gorge.

The man who died at St. Michael's hospital, Toronto, as the result of laudanum poisoning, has been identified as Charles Heida.

Sir James P. Whitney is expected to sail from England on September 19th. He will go on tour with R. L. Borden as soon as he returns.

In government circles in Winnipeg it is taken for granted that Hon. Hugh John Macdonald will be the dominion standard-bearer for the opposition.

A British retired officer is proposing to solve the woman suffrage problem by creating a third legislative chamber to be known as the "House of Ladies."

Ward 7, as part of Toronto, known as Ward 7, its bonded indebtedness of one million dollars will be taxed for by special arrangement.

Col. Robertson and a detachment of the 4th Highlanders, Toronto, taking part in the English army manoeuvres, as the guests of the war office, were presented to the king on Monday.

George Raybold, arrested at Fruitland, Ont., charged with stealing a horse and buggy from Byron Beamer and setting fire to the latter's barns to conceal the crime, was committed for trial.

At Windsor, Ont., on September 4th, the new system of immigration inspection went into effect. During the day three or four persons, who attempted to cross from Detroit, were turned back.

The papers have it that after the elections the secretary of state is to be succeeded by Charles Murphy, K.C., as the Irish Catholic representative in the cabinet. Mr. Murphy will run in Russell county.

The Ontario Gazette announces the incorporation of the Great Lakes Steamship company of Toronto, with a capital of \$250,000, and with power to build and operate ships, to transport wharves, etc.

Hants liberals nominated Dr. J. B. Black for the commons, and West Peterborough liberals nominated Hon. J. Stratton, Brockville conservatives nominated John Webster to oppose Hon. G. P. Graham.

Ex-Mayor W. B. McMurrich, Toronto, passed away yesterday at his summer home on Lake Joseph, after an illness of many months. Mr. McMurrich was sixty-six years of age and had practised law in Toronto for more than forty-two years.

Prof. William Clark, of Trinity College, Toronto, was knocked down by a cyclist, after he had collided with a street car in Rosedale. An instant later he narrowly escaped a team of horses. He was shaken up, besides sustaining a bruise or cut on the head.

The Eucharistic congress in London, on Wednesday, is expected to be one of the most imposing demonstrations of modern times of the Roman Catholic faith. It will be distinguished by an appeal by Cardinal Van Impe to England to return to the unity of the Catholic faith.
