A PROPOSITION MADE

AS TO THE ERECTION OF A BIG HOTEL.

Chicago Men Here Again With Emigrant Architect-Kingston Must Give a Site-It's Now Up to Kingston to Act.

Dr. Dupuis and Mr. Henderson, of Chicago, hotel promoters, came back to Kingston, Monday, bringing with them George Palmer Graves, one of the most noted and busiest architects of Chicago, an Englishman with a reputation in two great countries.

The promoters do not propose a brick or wood hotel, as has hitherto been the idea of Kingstonsians. What they propose is a picturesque hotel like the magnificent Boldt Castle, opposite Alexandria Bay.

The Chicago promoters will not venture to Kingston with any further proposition until the question of a site has been thoroughly discussed by the hotel committee of the Board of Trade and city council, and when they do come back they will be prepared with plans.
