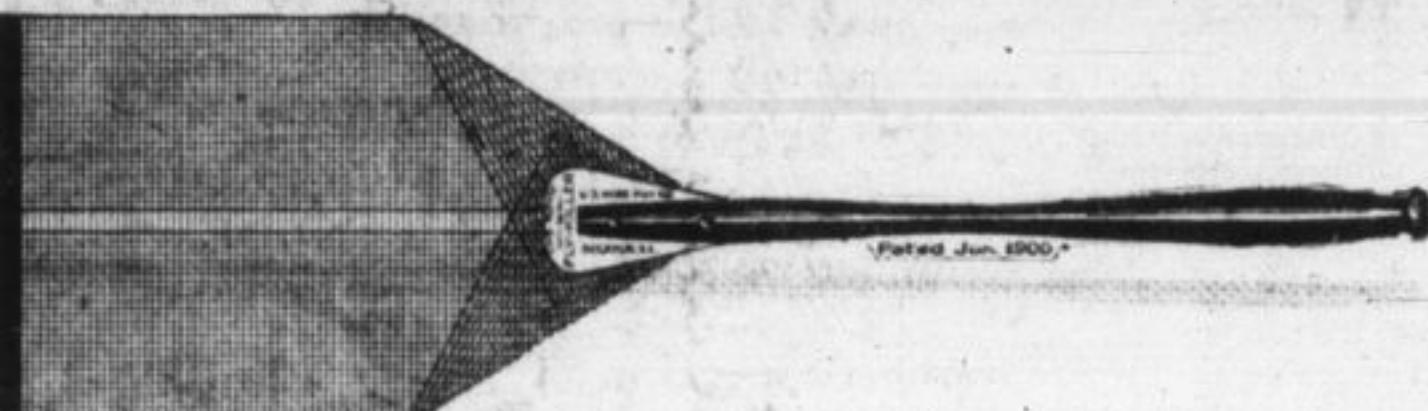

## CALLED A FAILURE

### THE STOCK EXCHANGE RECKLESS OF HONOR,

No Gambling House in Same Class; Even at Monte Carlo Every Winner is Paid in Full.

Another Wall street gambling-house has wretched. With the euphemism of high finance it is called a "failure," but the result is the same as if a book-maker bolted with his satchel or a gambling-house refused to redeem its chips. So long as the customers are on the wrong side of the market they lose. When they bet right the broker "assigns."

The Stock Exchange is so reckless of its honor as the Stock Exchange. At Monte Carlo the resources of the establishment are pledged to pay the losses at any table. When Gambler ran his Saratoga club any player knew that if the cash in the drawer of the table at which he played was not sufficient to redeem his tips, every other gambler would be called upon.

Frank recognizes the necessity for making gambling honest if it is to be allowed. Every member of the Paris Bourse is liable for every other member. A guarantee fund amounting to over \$300,000 is held under government control, and if it is exhausted the broker's individual liability is unlimited. If the Brown, Coster & McIntyre failures had been under the French law every customer would have been paid at once.

The Stock Exchange should not be able to avoid its liability for these losses. It is an unincorporated association, a voluntary partnership existing mainly for gambling purposes. It makes no public statements. Contrary to the French law, its rules provide that whenever a member fails his seat shall be sold for the benefit of his fellow-gamblers, not for his customers.

If the state is not going to close the Stock Exchange as the worst of gambling-houses of the world, it is its duty to make the Exchange members should at least be made as liable as in France and their funds on the state treasury should be punished.

### GRAND OPERA HOUSE.

### AFFECTS THE TITLE.

#### An Unnoticed Clause in a Man's Will.

Walkerville, Ont., Sept. 9.—It is said that a hitherto unnoticed clause in the will of Luke Montreuil, who, fifty years ago, was the owner of farm property now comprising a considerable part of this town, seriously affects the title of the present holders of the different plots of land sold from the original holdings of the Montreuil family. The elder Montreuil would the property to his son, Luke, now over eighty years of age with the evident intention that the latter should only have a half interest and that it should then descend to his children and if he died without issue it would revert to the brothers and sisters of Luke. The property extends along the river front for half a mile and is covered with residences and some of the largest factories in town and is estimated to be worth upwards of one million dollars.

#### Waves Dashing Over Vessel.

Detroit, Mich., Sept. 9.—P. Bissell, local agent of the Algoma Central Steamship Company, owner of the steamer King Edward, now lying on the rocks of Chantry Island, at the entrance to Southampton harbor, has returned to Detroit from the wreck of his vessel. His report was that the storm-bounded in Alpena over Sunday and did not reach the wreck until yesterday. The rough weather has not done the King Edward any good, as the waves were dashing over her port when Mr. Bissell left. The vessel lies in about four or five feet of water. Her injuries cannot be determined until the wreckers make a thorough examination.

#### Gov. Hughes A Welshman.

Albany, N.Y., Sept. 9.—Governor and Mrs. Hughes had as their guests, yesterday, at the executive mansion, the Royal Welsh choir. The members of the choir have been accorded the honor of singing at Windsor Castle before King Edward VII and Queen Alexandra. In visiting America they expressed a desire to sing before Governor Hughes, whom they said they consider, by reason of his Welsh extraction, the representative Welshman of this country.
