May Dispose of a Landmark in Ottawa—To Preach Christianity to the Japanese—Borden Can Have It.

Ottawa, Sept. 9.—Miss Ellen Driscoll, who had both legs broken in the Britannia street car accident, on Victoria Day, entered action, to-day, against the Ottawa Electric company, for \$10,000 damages.

A proposal is mooted to sell the first central steeple of the Dominion Methodist church, and to build a new church on a less high priced lot further out of the centre of the city.
