Ottawa, Sept. 9.—Miss Ellen Driscoll, who had a street broken on the Britannia road car accident, on Victoria Day, entered action, to-day, against the Ottawa Electric company for \$10,000 damages.

A proposal is mooted to sell the fine central site of the Dominion Methodist church, and to build a new church on a less high priced lot further out of the centre of the city. The church authorities are considering the idea, but the church is almost a landmark to the city.
