TOM JOHNSON'S ROAD TO DECIDE ON VALIDITY OF THREE-CENT FARE.

Taxpayer Also Brings Suit to Unset Grant, and Asks That a Receiver Be Appointed.

Cleveland, Sept. 11.—Faced by a financial crisis in the operation of the Cleveland street car lines at a three-cent fare by the Municipal Traction company, in which he is the controlling force, Mayor Tom L. Johnson in a special session of the council, had himself authorized to call a special election for October 22, in which the franchise under which the company is operating by lease from the Cleveland Railway company is to be submitted to the voters.

The mayor had fought calling the election, demanded through the efforts of the striking street car men, but a question of the legality of the franchise until it had been ratified, which it was feared would result in the refusal of the Cleveland Railway company, owner of the franchise, to issue stock to raise money needed by the municipal company.

To add to the intricacies of the situation, a suit was filed in common pleas court by James K. Farsey, taxpayer, asking that the security grant of the Cleveland Railway company be declared null and void and the lease of the property to the Municipal Traction company set aside.

It is declared that the franchise grant is a fraud because it provided a higher rate of fare than has been offered by the Cleveland Electric Railway company of seven tickets for twenty-five cents, with universal transfers.

Of the organization of the Municipal Traction company it is charged that the original directors of the company were selected by the mayor, and that they were at the time of their election mere tools and puppets of the mayor.

It is alleged that these original incorporators and directors of the company had no personal interest in the company, and though pretending to subscribe \$10,000 of the capital stock of the company, not one of them was the real owner of a single share of the stock.

After asking that the ordinances be declared null and void and the lease be set aside, the petition prays that the company be enjoined from operating under the franchise. The petition further asks that a receiver be appointed to take charge of the property of the Municipal Traction company, which it declares is utterly insolvent.

NATURE STUDY.

Man Watching a Woodchuck Gets a Fall.

Chicago Inter-Occidentals for us as an observant, an inquiring, and a studious person that our unselfish devotion to and enthusiasm for science is unaffected, unimpaired, and undiscouraged by the rebuffs which it is also often called upon to suffer, the obstacles which it is too often called upon to encounter.

There is, for example, the case of Joseph Hinkle, who lives on a farm two miles from Wrightville, near York, Penn. Mr. Hinkle, from all we have learned, is a passionate yet unpretentious devotee of natural science, one of those students of animal life who, while shrinking from notoriety, give all of their spare moments to their favorite pursuit, without looking or hoping for reward, either in the way of being noticed by your president or engaged by the low-price, high-class magazines.

Mr. Hinkle had a little time on his hands a few days ago and decided to put it to good use. Noticing a woodchuck foraging its hole and desirous of learning everything possible about the animal's moving day habits, Mr. Hinkle seized a fence rail, climbed a tree, fastened the rail between two limbs, sat upon it, and began his scientific observations.

It must have been a beautiful sight to see this great, strong man perched up there in the tree, forgetful of everything save the woodchuck and inspired and impelled only by an ambition to be the first to discover why the woodchuck should move in the heat and dust of August while he might have moved in any of the other eleven months with a great deal more personal comfort, to say nothing of the comfort of his wife and children.


