CANADIAN ROUTES GET. TING THE PREFERENCE.

An International Test of Three Routes and the Canadian Lines Proved the Speediest-Delay in England.

Canadian Gazette, Thank Heaven for your northern altitude, is the constant reminder given to Canada by outsiders. For one thing, it provides her with the world's best grain, and it freezes out the least fit both in man and the produce of the land. This week we are reminded of another advantage of Canada's northern position. The race was designed to test the routes from Japan to Europe by Vancouver, Scattle, and San Francisco respectively. This Canadian victory again accentuates the necessity of a speedy and suc-cessful termination of the negotiations concerned with the All-Red project. Hamar Greenwood has been assuring Canadians that the All-Red mail service to Australasia may yet materialize, but unless he knows more than the rest of us, the outlook is still vague and unomising. Fifteen months have passed ince British, Canadian, and Australasian ministers assembled at the Imperial Conference resolved in favor of the best service available "within reasonable cost," and pledged themselves to contribute "in equitable proportions," and, so far as the public knows, we are still in the region of abstract resolutions and pious hopes. British ministers must be held primarily responsible for this seeming dilatoriness, and it is for them to prove, as they have not yet done, their claim at the imperial conference that the quickening of mail and passenger communications and the state encouragement of a closer physical contact between the various states of the empire afford a more effective form of co-operation than the preferential trading proposals to which all colonial statesmen have attached first importance.
