NEEDS \$2,500 MORE

THE BOARD OF WORKS HAS A SHORTAGE.

Its Appropriation, Which Was Too Small, Has Been Overdrawn—The Council Must Provide More Funds.

The board of works is badly in need of more money. It has overdrawn by \$300 its appropriation, and must be provided with \$2,500 more if it is to do necessary work between now and the end of the year. The shortage is not on account of road rebuilding, which is a separate item altogether. The money voted for road construction can be used for that purpose alone. It is the regular appropriation that is gone, and there is a good reason for its early disappearance. Last year the board of works got about \$14,000. This year it received \$11,000, which amount was all the city council had for it. The extra amount of \$2,500 to complete the O'Kill street sewer, was taken from the board of works, on account of its being too late to have debentures issued for the amount. That deduction explains the present shortage.

This year the board of works has had some unusual expenditures. It had to pay \$1,219 for snow removal from the street railway tracks; \$424 for sewer repairs; \$250 for old concrete walk repairs; \$300 for Johnson street improvements; \$213.96 for plank walks. These expenditures were not met with in the previous year or two.

The board met this morning, with Aldermen Graham (chairman), Nickle, Henderson and Free in attendance. The city engineer reported in detail on the expenditures and what was required, and it was decided to ask the council this evening to provide \$2,500 for the further street work of the year. This can be done by carrying the O'Kill street sewer on an overdraft, and having the people ratify the issue of debentures for the amount at the January elections.

John Edward Ellis, formerly under-secretary-of-state for India, were united in marriage here, to-day, at the residence of the bride's sister, Mr. Roberts. The bride was unattended. After a reception Mr. and Mrs. Ellis left for New York, en route to their future home in England.

PETER RYAN'S VIEWS

HE HAS NEVER ASPIRED TO CABINET PLACE.

Has Never Been Offered One—He is Not Mixing in Politics—A Soldier From Cornwall in Trouble.

Ottawa, Sept. 14.—While it is said that Peter Ryan, of Toronto, is disappointed that he did not get the seat in the cabinet that is going to Charles Murphy, Peter Ryan himself when asked about these ambitions, this morning, said: "Political ambitions, I haven't any. I never recall the day when I aspired to a cabinet position, and I don't just recall any having ever been offered me. I am out of politics altogether."

"I never gave a party vote in my life," he stated when asked for an opinion on the political situation, and, at present, I am sitting tight, not hitting nor writing letters to the papers as Independent Citizen or Old Time Grit or Tory. I must say that Mr. Whitney treated me well. I am still registrar of Toronto. Perhaps no one else wants the job; anyway, I am holding it down. Politics in the province are hopelessly mixed, as I size it up. The ins are fighting to stay in and the outs are shouting to get in. In Toronto I may say that no leader is more popular than Laurier, till it comes to voting. Then it is different."

STILL AT WORK.

Another Complaint to Police About Dog Poisoner.

The dog poisoner is still at work. The latest report made to the police was that of a John street resident, which was received this afternoon. This resident was the owner of a fine collie dog, a family dog, on Saturday night, the dog was given poison, and was so ill on Sunday, that a veterinary surgeon had to be called to shoot the animal, so as to put it out of misery, as it could not live any longer.

"The dog was a home dog, and would not bite any one," said the owner. "If it had been troublesome, I would have no cause to complain, but it seems too bad that a person cannot keep a good dog."

This is only one of many cases of the same kind, which have come under the notice of the police of late, many valuable dogs having fallen a prey to the work of some cruel-hearted person. If sufficient evidence could be secured, some of the owners would lose very little time in prosecuting.

Wilkie, on the occasion of their leaving to take charge of the Royal Collieries, Limited, at Lethbridge. Mr. Dickson is a graduate of the Kingston School of Mining, and the eldest son of Charles T. Dickson, collector of inland revenue, of this city. He will be chief engineer of the operations at Lethbridge. He was presented with a case of meerschaum pipes of rare design and beauty. The Royal Collieries is the new \$,000 acre property acquired by the Fluorfeld-Galer interests, and of which, so much is expected by the coal mining fraternity of the west.

On Wednesday morning last, September 13th, in the presence of an audience which filled the Methodist church to the doors, Robert Patterson Saunders and Miss Deborah Carrie Fleming, were united in marriage. The church was beautifully decorated with flowers. Rev. Dr. Porter, pastor of the Methodist church, officiated. After the ceremony a sumptuous wedding breakfast was served at the residence of Hartley Fleming, brother of the bride. The happy couple left for Toronto by the boat, showered with rice, and followed by the best wishes of a large company of relatives and acquaintances assembled on the wharf.

BAD BUSH FIRES

The fire has been smoldering for about a week, but during the past few days has taken on a far more serious aspect. The fire has been playing great havoc, and the railway company has a gang of men at the scene, doing all they can to check it. Gilles Bros., of Brantford, who have lumber piled there, also have a number of men at work, and it is hoped the fire will soon be under control. The fire is mostly confined to the east and west of Folger Station.

It was feared that a call for help would have to be sent to Renfrew, but the men have done good work, and it is believed will be able to subdue the flames.

MINISTER RESIGNS.

Ottawa, Sept. 14.—Hon. R. W. Scott has resigned as secretary of state and is succeeded by Charles Murphy. It is said that Sir Richard Cartwright will resign before the week is over.
