## DECLINED TO SIGN

### THE PROTEST AGAINST ILL-TREATMENT.

A Kingstonian Was on the Allan Liner Corsican—Second-Class Passengers Had Nothing to Complain About.

Kingston, Sept. 14.—(To the Editor): My attention has been called to an article in your paper of Saturday last, and also in Montreal Star, dealing with indignities alleged to have been inflicted on the second-class passengers on the Allan liner Corsican by the medical officials of the immigration department.

I was returning by this steamer from a visit to England and was present at the meeting convened for the purpose of drawing up the protest, which I declined to sign, not being able to see any reasonable ground for the same. The forms that were given us to fill up, contained a few simple and lucid questions, none of which were objectionable and were easily filled up by anyone. The questions put by the commissioners on the basis of the replies contained in the forms were courteously made and speaking for myself were replied to in the same spirit and I had not the slightest trouble.

I made enquiry as to any preferential treatment of the first-class passengers, and could only find that the enquiry had been made amongst them, only somewhat more privately. It is only by this system of questions that it can be ascertained who is really a returning Canadian, and I was sorry to see the opposition from a class who I should have expected to have been proud that we have a capable government with the ability to make decisions and possess officials efficient in their carrying out and have done all in their power to assist the latter in doing so. It is very necessary to obtain this information so that undesirable persons are kept out and the deserving classes that Canada requires be helped to obtain what they and the country mutually need.

Why did not the reverend gentleman and his friends, if they were consistent in their complaint, as to differential treatment in proportion to the passage money paid, insist on all being subjected to the rigorous medical inspection afforded the steerage passengers with its accompanying vaccination—Yours truly, V. ### THE SPORT REVIEW.

Lull in Sporting Circles—Rugby Season at Hand.

Pittsburg will have a local hockey league of four teams again this winter.

Hans Wagner and Ty Cobb are the two greatest batters respectively in the National and American Baseball Leagues.

By winning Sunday's game from Wilkesbarre, Scranton made sure work of winning the New York State Baseball League pennant.

The cricket championship season of England was concluded on August 30th, when six first class counties concluded their programme. Yorkshire succeeded in going through the season without a defeat.

The Canadian record for a half-mile track was broken in the matinee of the Winnipeg Driving Club, Saturday, when Frank Wilkie, a well known free-for-all entry, stepped around the oval in 1:02.

The Indianapolis team captured the 1908 pennant of the American Baseball Association by defeating Louisville, in Saturday's game. The Indianapolis team has a lead now that cannot be overcome. The score: Indianapolis, 4; Louisville, 2.

Walter Johnson, the sensational pitcher of the Washington American League Club, has just accomplished the remarkable feat of twirling three successive games against one club in four days and scoring a shutout on each occasion. The New York team was the victim.

At Woodstock, N.B., the maritime ladies' golf championship ended with a decisive victory for Miss Mabel Thomson, of St. John, the champion over Mrs. Handsomebody, of Windsor, N.S., who had played a great game through the stages into the finals. Miss Thomson defeated her, however, eight up and seven to play. The championship meet next year will be in Halifax.

The Manitoba A.A. has finally decided to permit the Regina lacrosse team, champions of Western Canada, to play off with St. Paul for the international championship. St. Paul being professional, there has been considerable difficulty. W. Finlay, who opened the season with Toronto Tecumseh, is a member of the team, and on his account all have been under the ban.

At London, the English walker, T. E. Hammond, made a record for the 100-mile walk. He was one of the forty-two contestants who entered the walking contest, under the auspices of the Middlesex Walking Club. He covered the distance in eighteen hours four minutes and one-half seconds.

In 1907 Hammond made a record in walking from London to Brighton and back.

### FIRE SOMEWHAT SUBDUED.

Change For Better Around Folger Station.

Although still burning, the bush fires around Folger Station have been subdued to a great extent, and the danger point has now been passed. The fact that the wind has also gone down, has helped matters and it is now hoped that the fire will be checked in a very short time.

The dry weather has been the cause of many bush fires throughout the province, according to the dispatches which have been received. In such dry weather as at present, a spark from an engine will set fire to grass and brush alongside the track, and it would be impossible for section men to keep the fires down. Railroad officials are praying for a good heavy shower of rain. Farmers are also asking for rain.
