BROTHERS INVOLVED
BRUTAL MAFIA CRIME IS HEAVILY PUNISHED.

Participants in Outrage on Two Girls Get Sentences Aggregating Ninety-One Years.

Milan, Sept. 15.—At the Palermo assizes yesterday severe sentences were passed on four emissaries of the Mafia who were concerned, on October 31st last, in kidnapping the two elder daughters of Signor Zocchi, a well-known dairy proprietor, resident in the Sicilian capital.

The girls, whose ages are seventeen and eighteen, were enjoying an evening walk with their mother and younger sisters, when they were seized by eight men and driven off in a couple of carriages, in waiting around a corner. The girls were gagged with their own shawls to stifle their screams.

The mother and little ones were able to identify among the kidnapers two brothers named Bilecci, who were assisted by an old-uncle named Stefano.

It appeared that shortly after settling in Palermo from Vicenza, Signor Zocchi had lent two brothers \$2,000 to build a house. As associates of the Mafia, who mostly prey upon unwary non-Sicilians, these men had not only showed no intention of repaying Signor Zocchi, but began a policy of extortion, finishing up with a demand for both daughters, with \$3,000 dowry apiece. Signor Zocchi bluntly refused, and thereupon the brothers conceived the idea of ruing the girls in order to compel the father to come to terms.

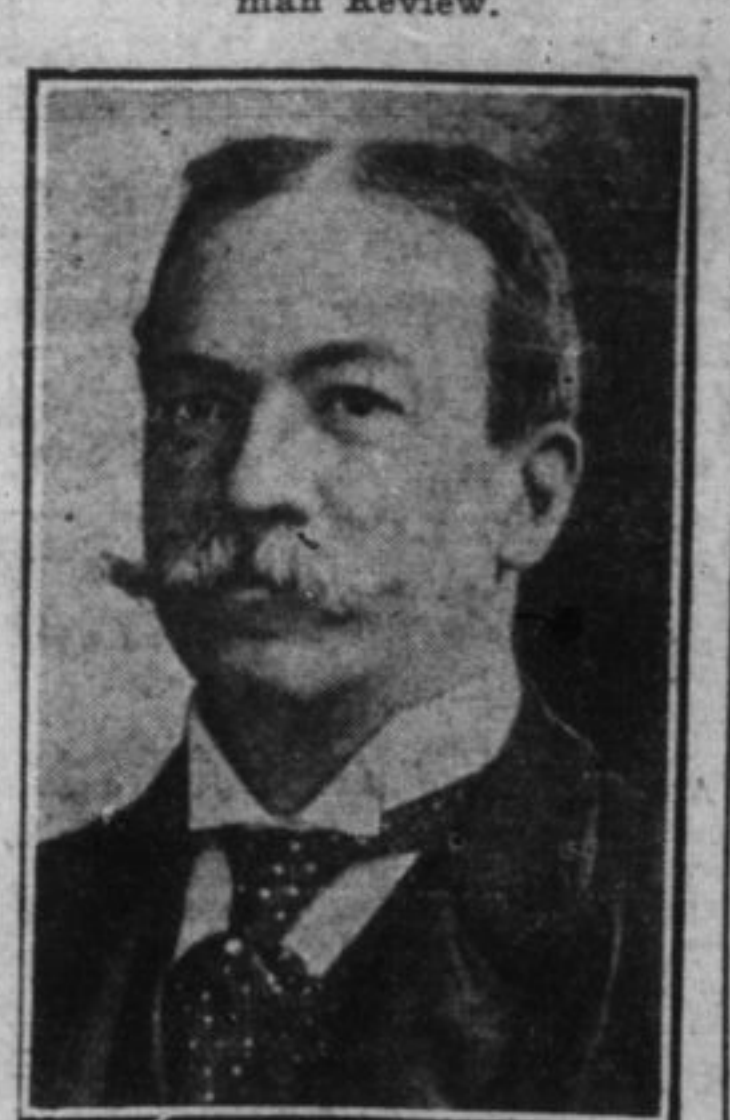
When, on the day following the kidnapping, Carabinieri tracked the gang to a country house, rented by the Bileccis, they had to break down five stout doors before they could rescue the captive girls, who were discovered in a heart-rending condition.

On refusing entering viands spread out on an artificially decorated supper table in an upper chamber, and also the blandishments of their captors, the sisters had been horribly assaulted by the brothers and uncle, while the rest of the conspirators, feasting below, sang songs to drown the victims' cries. A stubborn struggle had taken place, the supper board was overturned and the room strewn with wreckage.

The guilty brothers were arrested in a hiding place on the roof, half dead, with ugly wounds dealt them with champagne bottles by their victims. Though the accomplices of the band had flown, Stefano and one other were afterwards caught.

This revolting outrage met with fitting punishment in the apportionment of a total of ninety-one years' imprisonment. A minor accomplice got eight years, the younger brother, Domenico, twenty-five, and Giuseppe Bilecci twenty-eight years' solitary confinement, while the wicked old Stefano was doomed to the galleys for thirty years.

THE NEW DIPLOMACY.
 Scholarly Contribution to a German Review.

Dr. David Jayne Hill, the new American ambassador to Germany, contributes to a monthly review his opinions of modern diplomacy and the duties of modern diplomats. Hitherto, he says, the foundation on which the diplomacy rested was the doctrine that each state existed for itself alone, and the chief task of the diplomatist was to help strengthen his own state by weakening the others and destroying competition from them in his own country and injure their trade and industries in other countries.

"Now," says the ambassador, "a different view prevails, and just as modern political economists have overthrown false economic mercantile systems and the supposed advantage of possessing the largest stock of the precious metals, so the modern diplomatist must discard the old diplomacy and instead of separating nations bring them closer together; instead of sowing dissensions among them introduce order, law, and justice for their mutual relations.

"The best equipment for him who seeks to do this is a knowledge of history, and as a skillful physician proceeds to first acquaint himself with the whole physical and physiological history of the patient before prescribing, so a skillful diplomatist should first acquaint himself with the history of states before trying to bring jarring interests of nations in harmony.

The chief danger to-day, Dr. Hill thinks, lies in the conflict of commercial interests, the increase of population, the desire to acquire or extend territory and search for new markets and new colonies. He suggests a remedy by asking, "Is it, then, necessary to acquire political influence over territory in order to obtain commercial advantages therefrom and there in?"

The whole article is dominated by the thought that all states more and more belong to the real family of nations and the interests and happiness of the whole family are to be considered on the same parallel with the interests and happiness of individual countries and their peoples.
