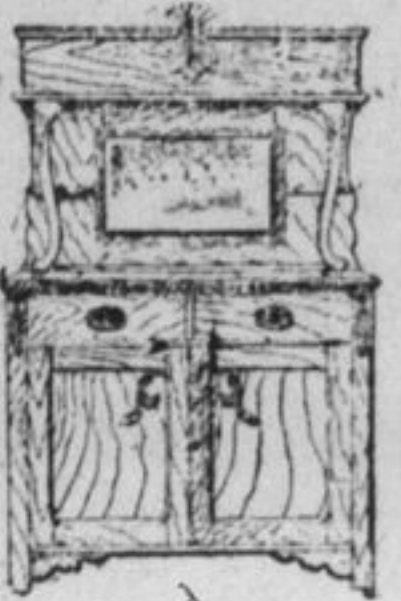

### THE SPORT REVIEW

#### SEASON'S FIRST ROLLER HOCKEY MATCH.

Locomotive Team Beat Maple Leafs 2 to 0—Queen's at Practice—Russell Britton Like-Ly to Coach Cadets.

The first roller hockey match of the season was played at the roller rink on Thursday evening between the C.L.C. and Maple Leafs, the former winning out two goals to nothing. The game was witnessed by a large number of spectators, fully 250 people being present. Polo promises to be a good drawing card this season. The game itself showed that both teams, although composed of good skaters, wanted practice and wanted it badly. It takes some time to get into the run of the game and the men have to practice steadily. The game is played just the same as hockey, with seven men to a side, in the same positions as the winter game. It is not as fast, either in skating or in stick handling, as the winter game.

In the first half, the C.L.C. scored one goal, Ryan and Little doing the trick. The Maple Leafs tried hard to even up, but could not work in through the Locomotive's defence. Time after time they charged down, but could not find the nets. The Maple Leafs played good hockey and with a little good practice will make a better showing. In the last half the C.L.C. scored another goal, making the final score two to nothing. The teams lined up as follows: C.L.C. (2)—G. O'Brien, goal; J. O'Brien, point; Hyland, cover-point; Ryan, rover; Little, centre; Pappas, left wing; Grattan, right wing. Maple Leafs (0)—E. Sowaris, goal; Boyd, point; Stansbury, cover-point; Roney, rover; Mostyn, centre; Walsh, left wing; Elmer, right wing.

Queen's Rugby Practice. Queen's had a goodly number out to practice on Thursday afternoon. Every day more men are arriving in the city, and they lose no time in getting out to work. From present appearances, Queen's will have a good team a better one than last season.

Many reports have been circulated about "Ken" Williams playing with other colleges, but it is understood that he has no thoughts of leaving Queen's, and will again appear in the old tri-colo uniform. If he left here would be a great loss to Queen's and a great gain to some other college in the union. He is one of the best half-backs in the intercollegiate, and is easily the best punter.

The two new trainers, McMahon and Campbell, will be down from Hamilton the beginning of next week, and will at once start to work with the team. They understand their work from start to finish and should be a great aid to the players. Queen's have their first game on October 10th, and will have to get in some hard grinds before then. Ottawa College has been playing for the past week and will have the advantage of their own grounds, the grounds they practice on. Ottawa will have the same team they have in the season, with the exception of one or two men who have graduated.

Britton For Cadets. It is rumored that Russell Britton has been secured by the cadets to coach them this season. If the R.M.C. have secured the services of Britton they certainly have got a good man, one who understands the game thoroughly and is up to all the latest dodges. The cadets will start work in earnest on Monday afternoon, and from then on will practice every afternoon. They have some good material and should be up near the top in their series.

Hope For City's Team. The final attempt to land a city football team will be made the first of next week, and it is to be hoped that those trying to arrange it will be successful in getting the team going. Two letters have been received from Mr. Gladish, secretary of the O.R.F.U., one by W. J. Paul, a few days ago, and one by the Whig about a week ago, asking for an application from one or more teams. If the right team will be secured here, as there is all kinds of material, the boys being only too anxious to get out and play. If the promoters do not see their way clear to enter a senior team, let them enter an intermediate or junior team, but a senior team would certainly be best to represent the city. Westmount and Toronto are the only ones entered as yet, and from the showing made by Limestone last year, it was clearly shown that they need fear nothing from either of these.

To Have A Game. With the view of turning out all the unknown talent and getting capable reserves for the city team, the Wanderers' club play the pick of Kingston in an association match on Saturday on the cricket field. Kick off at three o'clock. This should be an interesting game, and will be closely watched by the officials of the local club, with the chance of strengthening the team, if possible.

### HARD ON MARINERS

#### FOG AND SMOKE CAUSE THAT HAVE BEEN MADE FROM LIMESTONE?

Granite Was the Best Substance—No Street Faving This Year—The Streets Have to Be Got Into Proper Condition First.

Will the limestone-concrete walks laid by the city during the past few years stand a long period of wear? It is a question that some concrete contractors are discussing. One of them expressed the opinion that it was a great pity that granite had not been used for the top surface when so much good granite was so close at hand. The extra cost would not be a great deal, and the wear of the walks would be much longer. For instance, most of the granolithic walks constructed in the downtown section by the Kirby company, of Ottawa, fifteen and sixteen years ago, are as good to-day as when they were laid. Granite and concrete are better friends than limestone and concrete. They cling together much better, and thus a harder surface is the result. The secret was to be done against limestone during recent years. Look and feel much softer than the granolithic. However, a ten-year test will be required.

Street Paving Question. Next week, the city engineer may be ready to report on the question of paving streets for the business section. A special meeting of the board of works may be held to receive the report. It is safe to say, however, that no paved roads will be constructed this year. Before a beginning could be made the gas, water and sewer departments and the Bell Telephone company would have to be notified to proceed with whatever excavations they have in view. All bad mains and surfaces must be repaired before paving would be commenced. Along the street railway, something will have to be done against electrolysis, which is causing trouble to various pipes, particularly those of the water department. Whether the city or the company will effect the remedy is a question. Anyway there is much to do before paving can be undertaken.

BROUGHT TO A CLOSE. Horticultural Society's Show at Armouries.

One of the best shows ever held under the auspices of the Kingston Horticultural Society, was brought to a close at the armouries, last night. The exhibition proved a great success in every way. The exhibits were far superior to those of former years, and the attendance was far better than any other year. 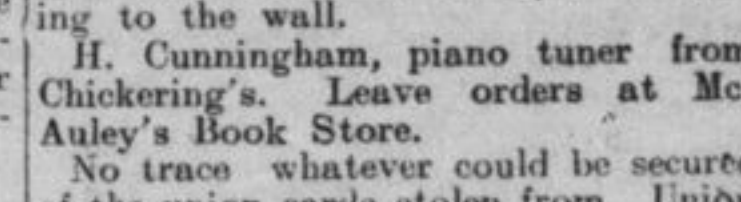
