

POLICE ARE LOOKING FOR AN ENGLISHMAN WHO DISAPPEARED.

His Name is Harry L. Ride—The Coroners Jury's Verdict in Michigan Central Railway Tunnel Fatality of Tuesday.

Windsor, Ont., Sept. 18.—The police are looking for Harry L. Ride, an Englishman, who disappeared from his boarding house a week ago. Ride was employed in track construction work on the Michigan Central railway.

After an inquiry lasting several hours last night, the jury empaneled by Coroner Labelle to investigate the double fatality at the Michigan Central railway tunnel, on Tuesday morning, was unable to determine the cause of the fire which resulted in the disaster.

The Very Latest Culled From All Over The World.

It is proposed to take a police census of Toronto. J. B. A. Coon, whose general store at Havelock was recently destroyed by fire, has made an assignment.

At Port Arthur, Ont., bears came almost into the city and carried off three pigs from the farm of a man named Gadsden. Nine ships are overdue in New York. Fear is felt in shipping circles that some of them have foundered in the great gale raging on the Atlantic.

A posse of angry farmers are scouring miles of territory in Bereham township in search of a stranger who attempted to assault the seven-year-old daughter of Frank Doward.

A threatening forest fire has started on the mountain side, mid-way between Patenville, N.Y., and West Saugerties, N.Y., and it is feared that the blaze may do great damage.

Ontario Bank shareholders are talking of raising a fund to ensure legal action against the old board of directors, and asking the finance department at Ottawa to help in the fight.

At Greensburg, Pa., a portion of the Seventh Ward public school building has been closed for fumigation, since cases of diphtheria having been reported in that ward. The patients are members of four families. The drought has made the flushing of sewers impossible and President Clements, of the board of health, says the diphtheria cases are directly due to this.

MAGIC OF LAURIER

PERSONAL MAGNETISM IS WONDERFUL.

Spectators Saw But Could Not Hear Him—They Seemed to Drink in His Words and Respond to His Gestures—Demand to See Premier.

Niagara Falls, Sept. 16.—Laurier and the larger handshakes will be the motto of the open-air campaign which the chief minister inaugurated yesterday at Niagara Falls; for the old and physical handshakes has been relegated somewhat to the background, and the Premier of Canada "shook hands" metaphorically with a vast audience of fifteen thousand people.

With a stiff breeze blowing, with the Falls within hearing, and indeed within sight, with cars passing on the highway not far off, the speakers reached with their words no larger an audience than could have been gathered in a good-sized hall.

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INDIA'S IDLE \$1,500,000,000. \$55,000,000 is Added to Hoard Annually.

London, Sept. 18.—Sir Ernest Cable, a former member of the Viceroy of India's cabinet and an ex-president of the Bengal Chamber of Commerce, writing to The Times, maintains that there is an enormous amount of wealth—estimated, he says, by persons in the highest circles at \$300,000,000—lying idle in India.
