INCREASED VOLUME**The Farmers' Relation to the Government.****By Wise Direction and Intelligent Assistance Better Returns Have Been Realized For the Fruit of Their Labors.**

Toronto Star. In the twelve months ending with June 30, 1896 the exports of Canadian farm products amounted to fifty and one-half million dollars.

In the nine months which I made up the fiscal year ending with March 31, 1907, the value of farm products exported was \$91,300,000.

Thus in three-quarters of the year 1907 our exports in this line were eighty per cent greater than they were for the full fiscal year of 1896.

This phenomenal expansion in exports of foodstuffs becomes all the more remarkable when the increase in consumption in the home market is taken into account. The extent to which the home market has grown may be gauged from two simple statements of fact:

(1) The salaries and wages paid in Canadian manufacturing establishments in 1901 amounted to \$112,249,000, while the wages alone totalled \$134,375,000 in 1906.

(2) The cost of operating the steam railways of the country increased from \$67,481,000 in 1903 to \$103,748,000 in 1907.

These additions to the operating expense of railways and the wage bill of manufacturers could not have taken place without creating a corresponding expansion in the local demand for foodstuffs produced on Canadian farms. The assertion may safely be ventured that great as has been the development in the market beyond our borders the development in the home market has been greater still.

All this progress is not the result of chance. There is a reason for it.

The chief explanation of the onward movement in agriculture is found in the intelligence, industry, and progressive spirit of the Canadian farmer. Much is owing to the admirable work done through the Farmers' Institutes, and the agricultural press of the Dominion. But it is simply stating a fact when it is declared that one of the principal influences in making for progress emanated from Ottawa.

The work of the Dominion Government has told in many ways. The Dominion Experimental Farms have disseminated a vast fund of valuable information regarding varieties and methods.

Many of our most profitable grain crops had their origin in samples sent from Ottawa. The Seed Division has performed a most useful service in its own door.

In brief, the Dominion government, by wise direction and intelligent assistance, has materially aided in increasing the volume of farm production and in securing for producers better returns for the fruit of their labours.

It is eminently fitting that a government which has done so much for material well-being on the farm has now undertaken to give the farmer city conveniences by delivering his mail at his own door.

(3) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than one mile in a due line.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

QUARTZ—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee \$5.00. At least 100 acres must be located on the claim each year, or paid to the mining recorder. When \$500.00 has been expended or paid for other requirements, the claim may be purchased for \$1.00 an acre.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$2.00.

DRAINS—A permit of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10.00 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2½ per cent. If the output exceeds \$10,000.

PRINCE BECAME PRIEST.

Brother of King Appointed Principal Professor.

Prince Max of Saxony, a brother of the king of that country, and who in 1896 took holy orders, has been appointed principal professor of liturgy and canon law at the Swiss University of Freiburg. Prince Max, who is a doctor of laws and theology, was born in 1866, is 42, and is a remarkably handsome man. He was always a student and bookworm; but it was not until he suffered a great disappointment in love that he turned his attention to the church.

When he was about twenty-five he fell in love with a pretty girl, a daughter of a Saxon colonel of cavalry. As the house laws of the Wettingen (the family name of the royal house of Saxony) do not allow any member of the family to wed without the commission of the king, and as Prince Max was too noble-minded to contract either amorganatic marriage or to associate himself with the lady in any other way, he determined to study for the church.

Twelve years ago he was consecrated a priest, and after years of wandering in various European countries, some of which were spent in slim work, he received the appointment of assistant professor of liturgy and canon law at Freiburg, where he has now been placed.

Prince Max is regarded as by no means a great scholar, but as one of the greatest teachers of his special subjects in all Europe. He has an exceedingly winning manner with the young ecclesiastics who attend his lectures, and he treats them all as friends and brethren.

The appanage of \$15,000 a year which he receives from Saxony is entirely devoted to works of charity, irrespective of the denomination to which the object of his charity belongs. He lives exclusively on his salary from the university, which until now has been \$750 a year.

Prince Max is credited with leanings toward republicanism, but evinces a special aversion to the Social Democrats; as long as they are hostile to Christianity.

He and his royal brother are on the best of terms and frequently see each other.
