Synopsis of Canadian Northwest. Homestead Regulations.

ANY even-numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Territory is a homestead.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet.

INCREASED VOLUME

The Farmers' Relation to the Government.

By Wise Direction and Intelligent Assistance Better Returns Have Been Realized For the Fruit of Their Labors.

Toronto Star. In the twelve months ending with June 30, 1906 the exports of Canadian farm products amounted to fifty and one-half million dollars.

In the nine months which made up the short fiscal year ending with March 31, 1907, the value of farm products exported was \$91,300,000.

Thus in three-quarters of the year 1907 our exports in this line were eighty per cent. greater than they were for the full fiscal year of 1906.

This phenomenal expansion in exports of foodstuffs becomes all the more remarkable in the home market is taken into account. The extent to which the home market has grown may be gauged from two simple statements of fact:

(1) The salaries and wages paid in Canadian manufacturing establishments in 1901 amounted to \$113,349,000, while the wages alone totalled \$134,375,000 in 1906.

(2) The cost of operating the steam railroads of the country increased from \$67,481,000 in 1903 to \$103,748,000 in 1907.

These additions to the operating expense of railroads and the wage bill of manufacturers could not have taken place without creating a corresponding expansion in the local demand for foodstuffs produced on Canadian farms.

MISSING M.P.P. RETURNS. Dickson Says He Stole No Public Money. St. John, N.B., Sept. 19.—W. B. Dickson, M.P.P. of Albert county, whose departure a fortnight ago was followed by the issue of an absconding debtor's warrant at the instance of W. A. MacKenzie, St. John, lumberman, whose agent had been, has returned to the city from the United States and went to his home in Hillsboro. Interviewed he said: "I went away on the advice of a friend, who told me it would be better to get out of the way for a few days. I have stayed as long as I want to, and now I have come back again."

LAWYERS WITHDRAW. Take Exception to Justice Martin's Rulings. Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 19.—The Victoria Brownell case, in which a rancher of Duncan, V.I., is alleged to be a bigamist, came to a sensational end when W. J. Taylor, K.C., and J. A. Aikman, who represented the plaintiff, withdrew from the court room objecting to Justice Martin's ruling as to cross-examination. Brownell, the defendant, was under cross-examination. Taylor asked him if he denied he went through the marriage form with another woman in 1902. No answer came, but he was asked to repeat in public the labels he is free to circulate under the shelter of parliamentary privilege. MUTINY ON A SCHOONER.

Sensational Incidents Marked the Voyage. Halifax, N.S., Sept. 19.—With one of her crew behind prison bars, and after forcing her way through great seas which swept the Nova Scotia coast, the Tern Lunenburg schooner H. R. Silver, in command of Captain Gerhardt, made her way into this port yesterday completing a voyage of five thousand miles, marked with sensational incidents, which show that mutiny on a shipboard is not a thing of the dim, and distant past.

The H. R. Silver went from Lunenburg last spring to St. John, Nfld., where Captain Gerhardt shipped a crew and loaded fish for Bahia, Brazil. He sailed out of St. John's Harbor on the morning of May 1, and was forty-seven days on the voyage down to Bahia, where the schooner set sail for San Fernando, Trinidad, where a part cargo of molasses was taken aboard. While the vessel was preparing to sail for St. Kitts, where they were to complete the cargo for Halifax, five members of the crew, including the cook, made their escape and could not be located.

While the captain was ashore making arrangements with the authorities the men scrambled down the side of the ship, and securing the boat, made their escape, rowing to land. The men were finally arrested and later sentenced to several days hard labor.

A temporary crew brought the schooner here.

Through the Railway Commission a reduction in cost and improvement in service has been forced upon the carrying companies. These reductions have added at least one cent to the farm value of every bushel of grain marketed in Ontario, fifty cents to the value of each beef bullock sold, and between five and ten per cent. to the returns obtained for a given volume by producers in the Niagara fruit district.

It is eminently fitting that a government which has done so much for material well-being for its farmers, should undertake to give the farmer city conveniences by delivering his mail at his own door.

What Good Can Be Expected of Them—The Sins Charged Against Them—Have They Shown Any Repentance. Three evil omens for public morality are the renominations of George E. Foster, George E. Fowler and Rufus Pope, for the House of Commons.

It is a grave reproach to the conservative party that these men have been chosen as its standard-bearers after the most conclusive evidence of their unfitness for positions of public trust.

Foster speculated for his own profit with the funds destined for the protection of widows and orphans—the savings of members of the Independent Order of Foresters of their own people. They have reason to excrete the man who, for his own miserable gain, risked the hard-earned money which represented on their part a self-denial of loving care for those nearest and dearest to them.

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Where The Germ Is Found. A correspondent suggests that it is about time cities paid more attention to what happens to milk after it gets to town, as well as before it is shipped.

A crusade among the restaurants in Washington recently resulted in wholesale indictments against those who tableware and kitchen utensils, harbored germs. What evidence of similar conditions might not be revealed if private kitchens were examined, especially in the poorer quarters of large cities? A little light upon such matters in every city, and a little mission work as to how diseases should be guarded against in the handling of food and beverages in markets, at restaurants, and in homes, as well as germ hunts in the old oaken bucket, might reveal the fact that the dairymen are not alone responsible when milk causes illness.

OUR PARLIAMENT

CHANGES SINCE CONFEDERATION.

Liberals Sure of Victory—The Success of 1900 and 1904—Changes in the Ministry—Few of the Old Campaigners in Evidence.

The Canadian confederation is no longer a baby state. It is almost forty-one years—November 6, 1867—since the first parliament of the Dominion was convened.

The personages of the House and of the leaders on both sides has changed greatly since 1867. Of the men who constituted Sir Charles Tupper's ministry in 1867 only four, Messrs. Foster, Ingham, Côté and Laidlaw, remain in public life.

Amid all these changes, however, there seems to be remarkable longevity in the supreme leadership. Sir John Macdonald was the governing force in Dominion politics from confederation till 1891, save for the brief MacKenzie period from 1874 to 1878.

Since 1866 Sir Wilfrid Laurier has been as unquestioned in his leadership of Liberalism as ever Sir John was in his leadership of Conservatism.

With two brief intervals, therefore, aggregating in all nine years, Macdonald and Laurier have ruled Canada ever since confederation. There is no other such record in modern political history.

Accused of Attempted Murder of a Girl. London, Sept. 19.—John Metcalf, a Canadian, a sailor on the Anian line Italian, was committed for trial on a charge of attempted murder of a pretty telephone girl. He, it is alleged, stabbed her and then walked away in silence.
