QUEEN'S RUGBY TRAINERS AT WORK.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest.

Homestead Regulations.

ANY even-numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest provinces, excepting 25 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section, of 160 acres, more or less.
Application for homesteaded entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be made by an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.
An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homesteaded entry.
DUTIES.—(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.
(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned wholly by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.
(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader had previously resided on farming land owned wholly by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in his residence, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than time taken in a direct line.
SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST MINING REGULATIONS.
COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.
QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,500 feet by 1,500 feet. Fee \$5.00. At least \$100.00 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500.00 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.
PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$10.00.
DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10.00 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2% per cent. after the output exceeds \$10,000.
