#### Late Marine Notes.

The schooner Kewatin cleared for Oswego, this afternoon. The steamer America, came over from Cape Vincent, this forenoon. The steamship John Randall is at Richardson's loading wheat for Washburn. The steamer Alexandria arrived at Folger's, this forenoon, on her way to Montreal. The steamer Rosemount, grain laden from Port William, and the steamer Waboussah, from Duluth, arrived at the M. T. Co's elevator at noon. The captains report the fog very heavy. Both vessels were anchored a few miles out, the most part of the night. The steamer Waboussah took on a pilot here and then cleared for Montreal.

### ASKED FOR COAL OIL WANTED TO BURN UP HIS FURNITURE.

Drunken Man Carted it Out of the House in Early Hours of Morning—Police Were Called to the Scene.

With a portion of his furniture out on the road in front of his home, at two o'clock on Tuesday morning, a York street resident, very much under the influence of liquor, stood beside it and cried out for coal oil, stating that he would burn all the furniture and the house as well. The coal oil was not forthcoming, however, and he was not given the chance to carry out his threat. It was the whiskey that was doing the talking. In his sober senses the man would never have got such an idea into his head. Last night he took an overdose of fire water while down town, not at all an unusual habit of his, and when he arrived home he commenced to make things very lively for the members of his family and also his neighbors. Making as much noise as he possibly could he carted out the furniture and placed it in a pile directly in front of his home. Members of the family endeavored to quiet him but they could not succeed. When he made the threat to burn up his furniture it was considered best to send in a call to the police.

Constables Mullinger and Davis responded to the call and at the sight of the bluecoats the man sobered up somewhat, and decided to keep the peace. The furniture was returned to the house, the police went back to the station, and the disturbed neighbors were very soon sound asleep again.

### LAURIER AMONG FRIENDS.

#### Best Meeting of Series—Graham Makes Announcement.

Tilbury, Sept. 11.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier spent the day among his own people. "Bon jour Monsieur" came a soft motherly voice from the steps of the car. It was Mme. Clement Ferrieu who spoke, and she told him that they went to school together when they were children together. Her eyes glistened with tears of joy as the prime minister told her how glad he was to meet her after the parting many years ago. "Madame," he said, "I am glad, I am very glad to meet my friend, who with me went to school a long time ago."

He alighted from the steps and talked with her a long time. The crowd which gathered for the speeches must have been close on to ten thousand. Sir Wilfrid spoke for about half an hour in English, repeating much of his Niagara Falls speech. Hon. J. P. Graham followed, dealing with issues as at Stratford. Sir Wilfrid then spoke for twenty minutes in French, his utterances being received with greatest enthusiasm by his compatriots who comprised possibly forty per cent. of the audience, which was swelled by excursions from Windsor, Leamington, Amherstburg and St. Thomas.

The premier declared that he must award Tilbury the palm for a large and enthusiastic demonstration. "My heart is touched far more than I can express. You represent in Tilbury the union of the races. That has been the cause to which I have devoted my life, and what abilities I have to unite together as a people those whom they have pleased to place together in Canada. We all admit that Ontario is the banner province of the dominion," acknowledged Sir Wilfrid.

The Ross rifle and Hodgins scandals have been exploded, said the premier. The name of Alexander Mackenzie was lauded now that he was gone from the scene. "They laud the dead in order that they may better slander the living," Hon. Mr. Graham described Tilbury as a land of corn, oil, wine and swine, with a little tobacco on the side. The minister stated that the Grand Trunk Pacific bargain was so good that another company stood ready to take it over if the railway wanted to withdraw.

Referring to the railway commission the minister said: "What we want is not long-drawn-out judgment, but a quick adjustment of any grievances that the people may have."
