DOING GREAT WORK

Y.M.C.A. PREPARES FOR A RECORD YEAR.

A Strong Religious Programme—Gift of Twenty-Four Steel Lockers Through the Ladies' Auxiliary.

The regular monthly meeting of the board of directors of the Young Men's Christian Association was held, Monday evening, in the members' parlor, when an interesting session was held. The members present were: Messrs. W. G. Anglin, M.D., (president), Mills, Gill, Harrison, Partridge, Birch, Chown, Lake, Laidlaw, Jordan, Bateman, Lockett and General Secretary Nelles.
The September meeting is always important inasmuch as the winter campaign is in view. Mr. Nelles gave his report and outlined the policy for the year. The financial report was read and at no time in recent years has the association been in such favorable circumstances. When the year's report is given in December the subscribers will find that the pledge given them early in the year will be fulfilled to the letter. A strong religious programme was presented, including these features: Bible classes, gymnasium men's Bible study club, normal class shop meetings and men's meeting Sunday afternoon. No more aggressive policy to reach men and boys has ever been presented in Kingston. E. M. Thomasson, the provincial field secretary, who was present, said that the local programme along religious lines was probably the strongest relatively in the province. The physical work committee reported through its chairman, George Birch. Various recommendations were adopted. It was decided to give the evenings over exclusively to men, on advice of the secretary. Parents will please note that no junior will be admitted to the building under any circumstances after six o'clock in future. The new physical director, J. J. Thompson, was reported as having done splendid work so far in that department and many new men are entering the classes. The various committees were appointed. David G. Laidlaw is chairman of the religious committee; Elmer Davis of the finance; Frank Kinnear of the physical; George Birch of the new membership committee.
The Woman's Auxiliary, of which Mrs. John Wright is president and Mrs. Oliver Chown, secretary, reported the gift of twenty-four steel lockers to equip the intermediate department.
The board expressed its highest praise of the record made by Nelson McCartney at the championship meet in Toronto. He is all-round boys' champion of Ontario.
E. M. Thomasson, of Toronto, gave a brief address. He congratulated the association on the great advance made during the past year and trusted that a great blessing might rest on the work this year.

The Late Miss McCormick.

The friends of Miss Margaret McCormick will learn with sincere regret of her death, on September 4th, at the home of her father, George McCormick, Atkinson, Ont., at the age of twenty years. REVENUE TOO SMALL

TO PERMIT SUPPLYING LIGHT TO PORTSMOUTH.

The Matter Held Over Till More Consumers Sign—The Committee Will Likely Appeal Against Plant Assessment.

The light, heat and power committee met, yesterday afternoon, with Able, Givens (chairman), Conner, M. Cann and McCartney in attendance. Manager Folger reported upon the question of supplying Portsmouth with electricity and gas and showed that, according to the number of proposed consumers, the revenue would be more than \$200 at the most, whereas it will require a revenue of \$366.66 a year to make the extensions pay the city. Only seven or eight residents of Portsmouth signed the petition. Hence the proposition to give Portsmouth light stands over for the present, until more of the residents decide to take advantage of the privilege. When the matter does come to a head, the question of franchise will have to be considered. Residents of Lower Albert street applied for gas. There are six on the street in question, covering a distance of 880 feet. It was figured that the lowest guarantee that could be accepted from each applicant would be a year. The committee was instructed to make this offer.
On recommendation of the manager, five dollars a year was fixed as flat rate for electrical energy for barbers' and massage machines. The machines cost an ordinary meter will not measure it.
The chairman and the manager were instructed to look into the assessment notice, concerning the plant, and report if the assessment should be applied against it. It is a little lower than the figure for this year. The committee was too late in appealing against this year's assessment, which was considered rather large.
The manager gave authority to seek the services of a capable man for the position of line foreman. An outsider will have to be secured, as there are no available men here at the present time.

Will Pay All Extra Cost.

The repairs to the interior of the new gas tank will be done by J. M. Campbell, free of all expense to the city, just as he intimated away last winter. The amount of money withheld from Mr. Tail's contract amount will go towards the repairs. Any extra money required in constructing the brick lining will be paid by Mr. Campbell, who is as desirous and eager as the civic light committee to have the tank foundation in the best possible condition. Mr. Campbell is not having the repairs made in any slipshod way. He has as adviser one of the best experts on the continent, and the latter has outlined everything that is required.

MARINE NEWS.

What is Found About the Wharves.

The steamer Dundurn, due up from Montreal, on Saturday night last, has not yet put in an appearance here.
The schooner Tradewind, Bertha Kalkins and Mary Ann Lydon, cleared for Oswego, and the schooner Bartlett cleared for Charlotte.
Swift's; Steamer Athleta, from Bay Point; steamer Rideau King, from Ottawa, to-day; schooner Cornelia cleared for Sodus to load coal.
The fog, although very thick during the night, cleared up considerably this morning and several vessels were able to clear. The steamer America did not come over from Cape Vincent, last night. The M. T. company's boats are moving to-day. Bartlett cleared for Montreal, with three barges, and the tug Mary cleared for that port, with two barges.
The steamer Rosemont, which arrived from Fort William with 63,000 bushels of wheat, cleared for Toronto from Montreal by the tug Bait-up from Montreal by the tug Bait-up.
The steamer Iroquois, carrying 30,000 bushels of wheat, discharged her cargo, and cleared for Fort William.

THE SOLDIERS RETURN

MEMBERS OF R.C.H.A. BACK FROM PETAWAWA.

All the Men Are Delighted With the Outing This Year—Driver Ellice Meets With Mishap.

With faces tanned, and looking the real picture of health, the members of the R.C.H.A., returned from camp, at Petawawa, Tuesday, arriving over at 3.30 P.M. via a special train at 3.30 o'clock, in the afternoon. Quite a crowd of citizens were on hand at the depot as the train pulled in, to greet the "soldier boys."
The home-coming was rather unexpected, as the report had been given out that the battery would be kept at the camp for a time longer, owing to the big bush fires, raging in the vicinity of the camp. The members state that the fires are quite a long distance away from the camp, and that there is no danger. The smoke from the fires caused a great deal of inconvenience in camp work, the smoke being so thick some days, that drilling had to be abandoned.
"One of the best camps we ever had," this is the verdict of all the men who have been at Petawawa camp a number of years, and for the first time, are also delighted with it. The C.P.R. gave the battery good accommodation going and coming back, the return trip being made in particularly good time.
Upon arrival yesterday, after a general hand shaking, the band and the men who were not detailed to look after the horses, formed in line and marched to the barracks, which have presented rather a deserted looking appearance for the past two months. The work of detaining was then proceeded with. The horses are all in the pink of condition, and the veterinary surgeons report that they all gave excellent service at the camp.
The members of the R.C.H.A. left Kingston to attend the big celebration at Quebec, on July 14th, and at the close of the celebration, went from there, to camp at Petawawa, so had quite a lengthy absence from the city. Although the men were delighted with the camp, they were very glad to get back into the barracks once more.
R. J. Reid's ambulance was called to the station, to remove Driver Ellice, suffering from an injured knee, the result of a horse rolling on to him. He will be around again in a very short time.
Sergeant A. Worth is laid up with muscular rheumatism, and there are also two convalescent typhoid fever patients, a couple more being left in the station hospital, at Pembroke. Taken as a whole, the camp was a very healthy one.

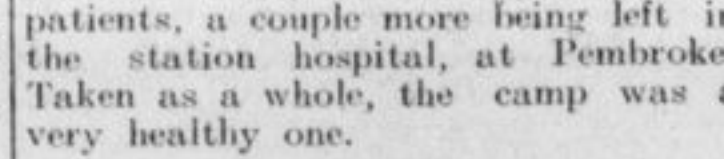

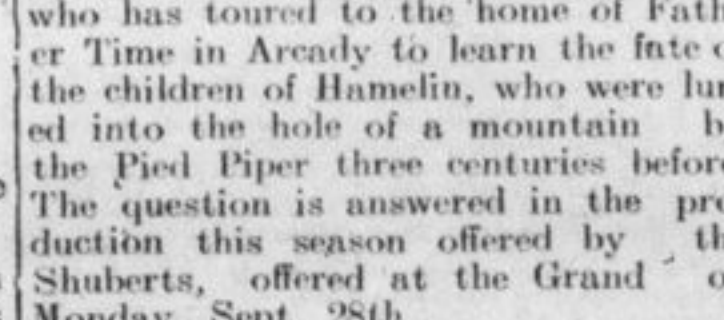

OPENED ON TUESDAY AND A BIG SUCCESS.

The Wolfe Island fair opened on Tuesday and the opening day was certainly a grand success. The weather was ideal, and had been for days before so that those in charge had time to fix things as they wanted them. The fair grounds were thronged by crowds of people all day long, and all who went found attractions that amused them.
The exhibits this year are larger than last year. In one exhibit the fruit and vegetables are on view. The vegetable show is of the best. Vegetables of all kinds and descriptions are on view, and some of them would take prizes at any fair in Ontario. The fruit exhibit is also good. All kinds of luscious fruits are tastily arranged on the boards, and the exhibit drew forth much praise.
All the live stock exhibits are well filled and on Tuesday the men were busy judging the different classes. The prize list will not be available until Thursday, as the prizes will not all be awarded until the last day.
In a neatly decorated building the women have their own exhibit and it is certainly worthy of notice. All kinds of home-made goods are on view. All sorts of preserves and pickles, and on the other side all kinds of fancy needle work, etc., are shown, and the latter do credit to the women of the island.

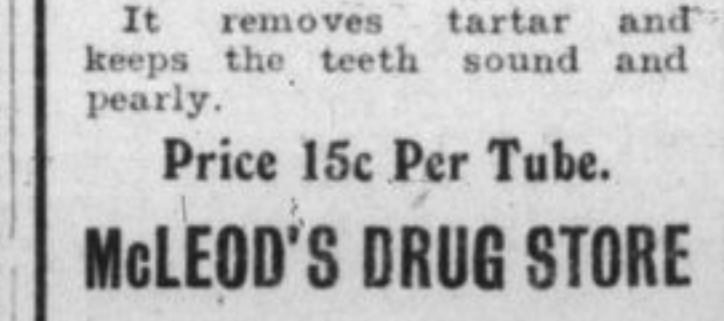
