### SWELL THIEF.

Confesses to Having Held Up Fifteen Men.

San Francisco, Sept. 23.—Charles Boyle, a former student of Stanford University, son of Henry Boyle, a millionaire property holder of Seattle and Oakland, and the most exclusive society circles of San Rafael, is alleged to have made confession of a number of

Unitarian. REV. C. W. CASSON.

On Rejecting Christ. The Unitarian church, instead of rejecting Jesus, as is so often foolishly stated, is in reality accepting Him in the very truest sense. It is not committed to the forced acceptance of every word that He spoke as infallible and every command as absolute. It takes Him as a man at his word, judges him upon his merits and to the worth of his message, and seeks to spread abroad what it believes to be the essence of his teaching, "love to God and love to man." It does not deal with him as a deity expiator, but as a human example who inspires, or should inspire, all men to nobler and diviner life.

The founder of Mahometanism had an intimate acquaintance with Christianity from many visits to Syria, where he met Jews and Christians, but he was deterred from becoming a Christian because of dissent at the warring factions which split the church. The inconsistency between the professions and the behavior of the fighting followers of Jesus prompted him to found his own religion, in which Jesus has a place as one of the prophets, but not as the supreme revelation of God to men. This acceptance of Jesus as a prophet, as one of the "beautiful" men of the human race, is common among many highly educated members of Indian religions. They concede the transcendent purity of the doctrine of life He taught in such utterance as the Sermon on the Mount. But

### CONDITIONS IN INDIA.

The Quiet Talk of a Returned Student.

Miss Elizabeth S. Colton, daughter of the late and famous "Father" Aaron Colton, has returned to Massachusetts after an absence of three years in India in the study of Oriental languages, literature and religions. She speaks six languages fluently, has studied fifteen critically and fifty-four carefully. Speaking of the religions of the great empire, she felt they were not understood in European countries. Although Brahminism extends back to pre-historic times, Buddhism has a definite date and a definite historical figure in Buddha, who lived about 506 B.C.
