

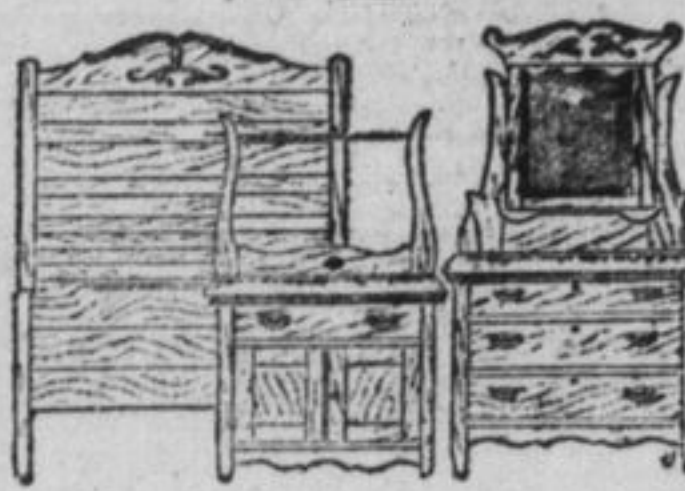

### ON SMELTER SITE TO NEW COMPANY.

A Dumping Ground at the End of Cataragui Street Proposed—City and Ontario Hall Exits to Be Improved.

At the city property committee, yesterday afternoon, there were present Alds. Angrove (chairman), Henderson, Free and Toye. A letter was received from R. E. Cushman, on behalf of the Canadian Lead and Smelter company, asking to enter into negotiations with the city for the lease or purchase of part of the smelter site. Ald. Henderson, who is interested in the company, said he did not intend to vote on the question, but he wanted to say that the company had its charter and had every hope of being a success. He said he hoped the city would not be thrown on the project by the city council. Very unfortunately, the council had thrown cold water on too many promising enterprises. It would be a mistake, he said, to not grant the option the company had asked for.

On motion of Ald. Toye, the committee decided to recommend to the council that an option be granted Mr. Cushman, on behalf of the company he represents, for a period of ninety days from August 15th. The city engineer reported that the city must acquire another dumping ground. He recommended that the city acquire the land required to extend Cataragui street through to Montreal street, which land could be used for dumping purposes. He also recommended that the city obtain permission from the owners of the properties abutting on the proposed extension of Cataragui street to dump for such distance out on their properties as is required for the slopes of the dump, to reach the final grade of the street. This matter was referred to the chairman and engineer to get an estimate of cost.

The engineer drew attention to the fact that the exits of the city and Ontario halls do not comply with the requirements of the by-law respecting egress from public buildings. He suggested that the city have its architect prepare plans to overcome this defect. The committee decided to do this, as it would never do for the city to prosecute others for not obeying the by-law, so long as its own buildings do not comply. The city hall rear exit must be enlarged, another handrail put on the main stairway; the Ontario hall front exit must be enlarged, and other exit provided for that hall.

Manager Taylor, of the Bank of British North America, applied for the use of one of the old police cells as a place to store some of the bank books. The request was granted.

The bill of Smith Bros., jewelers, for \$260, contract price, for two dials for the old city clock, was presented. Ald. Henderson raised the question as to whether the city was liable. Had the contract been fulfilled when the fire in the dome occurred? The chairman stated that the work was almost complete when the fire broke out. The second dial had just to be set in. Half an hour more would probably have completed the work. It was decided to refer the matter to the city solicitor for report.

## THE FAIR A SUCCESS

### CROWDS WENT OVER TO WOLFE ISLAND.

The Exhibits Were Very Fine—Result of the Horse Races—A Big Dance Was Held Wednesday Evening.

The weather man continued to smile on the Wolfe Island fair and the second day passed off in a most successful manner. Wednesday was the closing day, and from early morning until late at night the crowd kept pouring into the village from all over the island and the ferry boat brought large crowds from the city every trip. The crowd was far larger on Wednesday than on Tuesday, fully 2,000 people being present on the second day.

The judging was not all finished until late Wednesday night. The judges had so many things to pass judgment on and the competition was so keen that they were kept busy. It was mostly live stock that was judged on Wednesday, carriage horses, farm horses, cows, sheep, pigs, etc., were all there, and some fine specimens there were among them. The carriage horse class was well filled, one or two fine teams being shown.

All the different exhibits were surrounded with people all day long. The home-made exhibit was the centre of attraction for some time, and the ladies in charge were kept busy watching that their buns, bread, etc., were not carried off, but as soon as the prizes were awarded the women, with true island kindness gave the tasty buns and wholesome bread away freely to the visitors. The apples and other fruit on exhibition was also given away by their owners, and nearly everyone had a cut flower as he came out from the horticultural show, round the grounds the different booths and games of chance, all did a good business. No place is there as much amusement watching the crowd, and their doings as at a country fair.

The exhibit of painting and needle work was grand, and would come in for a prize at any Canadian fair. The main attraction for the male portion of the celebration was the horse races, and they were certainly good ones. The races were better than the previous day, and drew larger crowds. Two good races, the named the by-law, and the named the needle work, were pulled off in every heat the finish was very close and the winner had no easy time of it.

The Wolfe Island ball team, put up another exhibition against a junior team called the Gilt Edge. The island team won out easily, the score being thirty-four runs to eight. The game was much too one-sided.

A dance was held in the C.M.B.A. hall in the evening, and a number of the city stayed over for it. The boat returned from the city at eight o'clock with another load for the dance. The dance was most enjoyable, music was supplied by Crook and O'Connor's orchestra. The boat returned to the city at two o'clock, Thursday morning.

### MARINE NEWS.

#### What is Found About the Wharves.

The fog of last night again held the steamer America at Cape Vincent, the vessel being unable to make the trip. The steamers Fairmount and Westmount, grain laden, have cleared from Fort William, on the way to the M.T. company.

The schooner Ford-River is at Richmonds', loading feldspar, for Charlotte. This will probably be the last load to go over this season. Swift's Steamer Dundurn, up, Wednesday afternoon, three days late; steamer Alberta, from bay points, today; steamer Ridgway King, did not arrive from Ottawa until today, about eighteen hours late; steamer Belleville, down, today, one day late. Smoke and fog-keep the boats about a day and a half late on all routes.

### Awaiting Development.

The local conservative association executive has had several meetings during the past week or so in regard to putting a candidate in the field in the coming federal election, but so far has arrived at no decision. The Tories are waiting to see the result of things in the grit camp. They know they cannot defeat Hon. William Hart, M.P., to whom the liberals have offered a unanimous nomination, and are waiting his reply. In the event of Mr. Hart's running, there is a possibility of him being unopposed. If he is, his election is a foregone conclusion, and what is bothering the Tory executive is which among their number is to be the goat put up for slaughter.
