THE NEWS OF THE WORLD OCCURRENCES RECOUNTED IN BRIEF FORM.

Matters That Interest Everybody - Notes From All Over - Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

The SS. Manchester shipper, inward, at Father Point.
George Smith, M.P. of North Oxford, may become junior judge of Essex county.
A young Russian laborer was arrested, charged with poisoning cattle in York county.
Sir Wilfrid Laurier had another audience at Clinton, and addressed an audience of three thousand people.
Cholera in St. Petersburg is said to be under control and the report from Berlin proves a false alarm.
A middle-aged woman threw herself over the Falls from Goat Island. She is believed to have come from Buffalo.
Toronto (middle) won the second prize for drill at the session of the Sovereign grand lodge at Denver, Col.
Bernard Sloan, Vinton, is the new sheriff of Pontiac. He is a brother of Canon Sloan, of St. Bridget's church, Ottawa.
The congregation of Erskine Presbyterian church, Ottawa, has decided to extend a call to Rev. C. W. Nicol, Sherbrooke.
Three dogs, one of which had developed rabies and had bitten the other two, were shot and killed by P. C. Childs, of Toronto.
Thomas McShea, a middle-aged man, was instantly killed in the Michigan Central railway yards at St. Thomas, Ont., on Thursday.
Two were killed and more than fifty persons were injured in a wreck of the eastbound Frisco passenger train because he struck the first blow, George Symons, who was beaten by a Toronto street car conductor, was convicted of assault but not punished.
President Pullman, of the National League, has announced his decision in the New York Chicago case on Wednesday. He declared the game a tie.
Redding, Cal., was visited with half a million dollar fire on Thursday. Two summer hotels and a number of stores and downtown buildings were destroyed.
Robert Bruce, controller of the London postal service, is at Washington striving to increase the efficiency of the mail service between the United States and Britain.
George Sills, son of W. C. Sills, Tweed, was fatally hurt while painting the Methodist church. The scaffold gave way and he fell a distance of fifty feet.
The steamer Iron King ran on Greecian Shoal, south of Colchester, Ont., during a heavy fog. She is bound up, loaded with salt. The weather is favorable.
Toronto received as its share of earnings of percentage and mileage allowance from the street railway for one year ending August 31st, the respectable sum of \$522,200.
Hugh Marshall, Gerard Ward and Alfred B. Williams were arrested at Oakville, Ont., on a charge of house-breaking and sentenced to one year each in the Central prison.
For stealing \$41 from the pockets of Thomas Tabor, Lizzie Davis, a young colored woman of Toronto, was sent to the Central, this morning, to serve a sentence of three months.
A violation of the law concerning the weight of loaves of bread, sixty-two loaves, from a Detroit bakery, were seized at Windsor, and will be distributed to charitable institutions.
Letters from Caracas announce a fresh outbreak of the bubonic plague in the Venezuelan capital. The disease is spreading, and a number of deaths have occurred among people of the better class.
Motorman S. Wrother and Conductor J. Dolan, Toronto street railway, were convicted of assaulting Charles M. Currie, a passenger on a car of which they had charge, and fined \$5 and costs.
Heavy smoke from forest fires was responsible for a collision on the New York Central line, west of Little Falls, N.Y. One mail clerk was killed, the crew bruised and hurt. Passengers escaped with a shaking up.
A great forest fire is raging near Eureka, Cal., fanned by a fifty-mile gale, and already the plant of the Red-Lumber Co., valued at \$60,000, has been destroyed. The fire is threatening several vast tracts of timber land.
An option has been given to New Yorkers on eighty-seven acres adjoining the Saugen Salt and Lumber Co.'s premises, Sandwich, Ont., and on what is regarded as good as thirty blast furnaces will be started by people in close touch with the Steel Trust.
Thomas Smart, Belleville, Ont., charged with the murder of his step-father, James Suro, was up for investigation before Magistrate Mason today. After some evidence had been taken about the same as that given at the inquest, the prisoner was formally committed for trial.
