### Synopsis of Canadian Northwest.

#### Homestead Regulations.

A NY even-numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of any quarter section, of 100 acres or less.

Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be made by an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader.

An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be eligible for homestead entry.

DUTIES.—(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year during the term of three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased, of a homesteader had permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon such homestead he may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother) in the vicinity.

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line.

#### MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL.—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years at an annual rental of \$1.00 an acre. Not more than 2,000 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton.

QUARTZ.—A person eighteen years of age and over having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,000 feet by 1,000 feet. Fee \$5.00. At least \$100.00 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the mining recorder. When \$500.00 has been expended or paid and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1.00 an acre.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS generally, 100 feet square. Entry fee, \$5.00.

DREDGING.—Two leases of five miles each of a river may be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10.00 a mile per annum. Royalty, 1% per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.

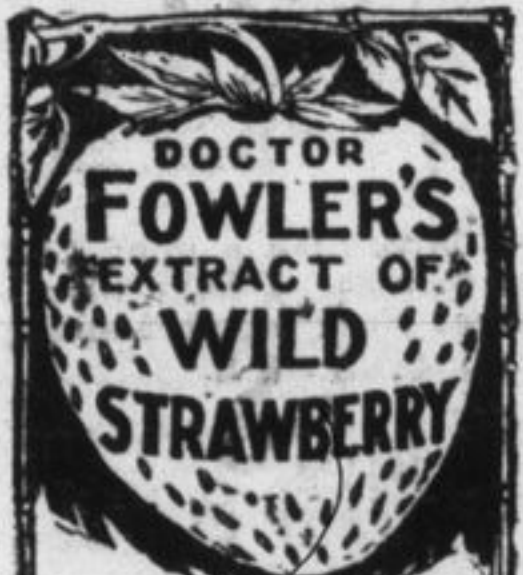

### THE SPORT REVIEW

J. J. CORBETT'S OPINION OF TOMMY BURNS.

Judge McDonald Opposes International Athletic Contests—Women Wrestlers Disport Themselves in Toronto.

Galt is organizing a kennel club and will hold annual shows. A match between Nelson and McFarland at forty-five rounds will be arranged for the coast at once. The Toronto Athletic Club is trying to arrange an exhibition rugby match with Ottawa College for Thanksgiving day.

James J. Corbett, erstwhile champion prize dispenser of the world, who is now grinding out fight dope for the Chicago Tribune readers, offers the following comment on "Tommy" Burns: "Burns, I think, as a rule, is underestimated by the fighting fans. 'Tommy,' for his inches, is one of the greatest fighting machines in the world. He knows both how to attack an opponent and how to defend himself when he has to. And as for either Ketchel or Papke being able to lick him at this stage of the game it seems almost out of the question. Ketchel demonstrated in his fight with Papke at Los Angeles that when it came to defensive fighting he was not in the championship class. Burns, on the other hand, has always shown that he knew how to take care of himself when up against a hard hitter or a slugger."

The Brockville Rowing Club has just closed a successful year, and at an enthusiastic annual meeting the reports gave splendid satisfaction. The receipts totalled in the neighborhood of \$2,000, and the largest item of expenditure was the sending of crews to the Canadian Henley. The principal officers elected were: President, F. L. Ritchie; first vice-president, B. White; second vice-president, Dr. P. Chirill; secretary-treasurer, L. C. Dargavel; captain, A. O. Donahoe. Judge McDonald, who was at Henley during the Pan-Atlantic congress, presented the cups for the spring regatta, and in speaking of athletics deplored the bitter feeling which some decisions in the Olympic games engendered. He expressed his strong opposition to international athletic contests, and thought they should be done away with in future.

Montreal despatch says: "Chauncey" Elliott limped around on crutches superintending everything from the line when he could see the players. With the aid of a pair of crutches and a car, Montreal's head coach wended his way to the grounds, to be on time for the morning's practice.
