EASY LAW IN NORTH CHRISTIAN GUARDIAN MAKES ALLEGATIONS.

Blind Pigs Abound and Immoral Places Flourish on Montreal River—Paper Says Higher Type of Officer is Needed.

The Christian Guardian has some rather severe comments to make on the administration of the law in New Ontario. It claims that houses of ill-fame are allowed to flourish undisturbed up and down Montreal River. The allegation is also made that the convicted keeper of a blind pig was made a provincial constable. The paper states that foreigners are maltreated and driven back to work at the point of a revolver. In connection with the houses of ill-fame the Guardian says that the inmates are located by agents at convenient points over the mining territory.

With regard to blind pigs the same paper alleges that they abound. The question is asked if the penalty of imprisonment is never reached of what use are the prosecutions? The claim is made that the government railway should not carry liquor into the country at all.

"It is evident," continues the article in question, "that the whole police system of the province needs reorganization, and to be manned by a higher type of officer, if respect for law and order is to be maintained."

EAGLE SWOOPS ON CHILD.

Hard Battle Before it is Finally Captured.

New York, Sept. 23.—Hundreds of persons journeyed out to the physical culture camp, near Helmetta, N.J., to see a large bald eagle which was captured last Thursday while attempting to carry away a three-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Cribler, who are spending the summer in the woods.

The child is small for her age, and several times had told her mother that she was afraid of a big turkey that flew down close to her while she was at play. The parents gave no heed to the child's story until yesterday, when they were startled by her agonized screams.

Hastening from their shack they were horrified to see a huge eagle, with its talons set in the child's arm, flapping its great wings and trying to rise with its prey. Mr. Cribler ran to the rescue of the little one, while Paul Cribler, his brother, caught up a shotgun and followed him.

Mrs. Cribler was nearly crazed with fright and followed the men screaming. When Mr. Cribler reached the eagle he attacked it with a club, but so intent was the bird in getting away with its prey that he was obliged to strike it several blows before it released its grip on the child's arm. As the eagle rose Paul Cribler fired and wounded the eagle so that it flopped to the earth and was placed in a cage.

The child's arm is severely lacerated and swollen, and its dress was torn to rags in the struggle. The eagle measured five feet nine inches from tip to tip and when the gash wounds in its wings are healed it will be sent to the Bronx Zoological Park.

SPENDING \$1,400 ON DEAD DOG

Coffin For Pet to Cost \$200, and Monument \$1,200.

Stratford, Conn., Sept. 23.—In a metal coffin with a plate glass top, and trimmed and lined with white satin, the body of Diana, a Japanese spaniel owned by Mrs. Florence Baldwin, of Elmswood, Ferry Road, Stratford, was taken to Hartsdale, N.Y., and buried in the dog cemetery there.

Diana was born in the Waldorf-Astoria, New York, eleven years ago, two weeks after her mother arrived from Japan. She had a long and blue-blooded pedigree, and was then owned by Mrs. Mary Weston, from whom Mrs. Baldwin bought her when Diana was six weeks old for \$400. Mrs. Baldwin removed from New York three years ago.

Mrs. Baldwin, distracted with grief at the loss of her pet ordered a special coffin, costing \$200.

Mrs. Baldwin has ordered a \$1,200 monument to mark Diana's resting place in the spaniel's head cut in the stone. She has selected twelve active and honorary pall-bearers to accompany the body to Hartsdale.

GOULD DIVORCE SUITS.

Katherine Clemmons Asks Alimony of \$120,000.

New York, Sept. 23.—Mrs. Katherine Clemmons Gould, who is suing Howard Gould for divorce, to-day applied through counsel to Justice Giegerich for an order compelling Mr. Gould to pay her \$120,000 a year alimony and \$15,000 for her counsel fees. After a hearing the justice adjourned the argument until October 1st, at the request of Cornelius Sullivan, counsel for Mr. Gould. Mr. Sullivan said he must have more time to examine the papers in the case. Immediately following the temporary disposition of this action, the case of Helen Kelly Gould against Frank J. Gould for absolute divorce was called before Justice Giegerich in the same court room. The proceedings in this case were brief, the court merely fixing the date, Oct. 2nd, for a hearing on the motion.

KAISER AND ADVERTISEMENT

Responsible For Defacing North Cape.

London, Sept. 23.—North Cape, the most northerly point in Europe, on the Island of Mageroe, Norway, is defaced by advertisements, for which Kaiser William is responsible. When a few summers ago he visited the Cape, he allowed the local authorities to paint the name of his yacht, Hohenzollern, in letters fifteen feet in height on the face of the extreme point of rock. At once various German shipping firms painted the names of their vessels in striking letters on the North Cape, then an enterprising chocolate maker followed their example. He in turn was followed by a firm of boot-blacking makers. Small prices were at first charged for space, but they were raised as time went on, and now space for an advertisement on North Cape is very costly.

LAYMEN'S MOVEMENT.

Series of Meetings in Ottawa Next Week.

A series of meetings will be held in Ottawa next week by the Laymen's Missionary Movement. In a pamphlet issued by the Canadian Council in Toronto it is stated that the object and scope of the movement is "an inter-denominational and international movement of co-operation among the laymen of the various Christian churches, designed to stimulate and maintain among the laymen of the churches of North America, an intelligent and active interest in the speedy evangelization of the world, in co-operation with the mission board and societies of the various churches."

The movement was originated in the missionary interest and has reference to home and foreign missions alone. The motto of the movement is "The world for Christ in this generation," and the question is "Will Canada evangelize her share of the world?"

The campaign in Canada is now in full swing. Splendid results have been obtained in Toronto, Montreal and in the Maritime Provinces. The spiritual life of the congregations in these centres has been quickened to such an extent that it has been decided to inaugurate a vigorous campaign across Canada from the Atlantic to the Pacific. What does the success of this movement mean? It means that the gospel will be preached to forty millions of non-Christian people, the sending out of four additional missionaries to every one now in the foreign field, with the corresponding financial obligation.

It is believed that the church in Canada has now the requisite material for supplying the workers and the funds. Wherever meetings have been held it has been unanimously resolved and recorded that Canada should undertake her full share of responsibility in this world-wide movement and at once proceed to the accomplishment of her task.

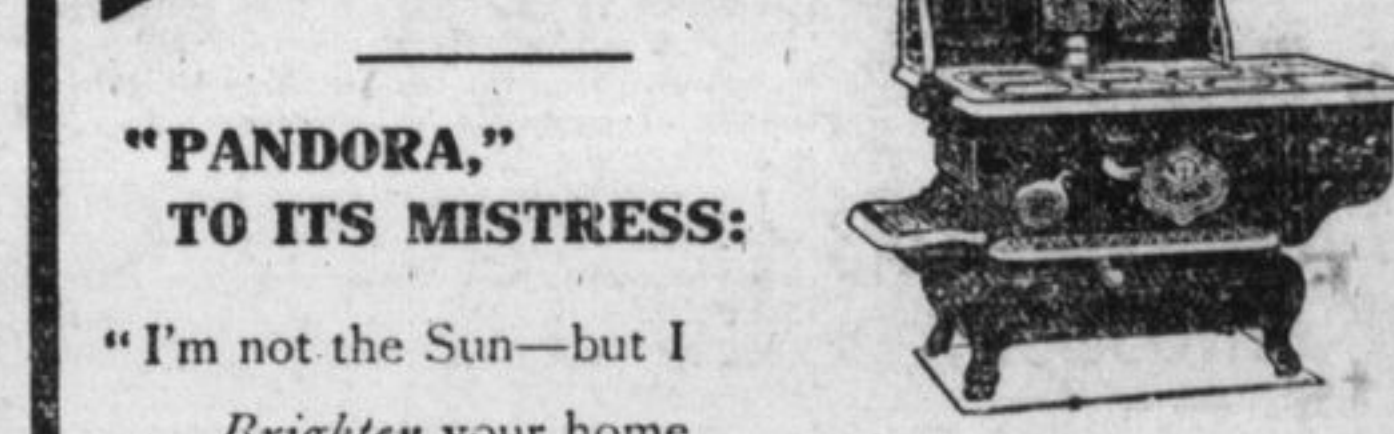
