Matters That Interest Everybody—Notes From All Over—Little of Everything Easily Read and Remembered.

The population of Toronto, according to the assessors in 287,201. Cheese sales: Campbellford, 905 at 12 1/2-16c; Stirling, 255, at 12c.

East Toronto will be formally annexed to the city on December 15th. Y. W. C. A. collectors at Stratford gathered on tag day \$1,000 in aid of their new building.

The agent of the Manitoba government says work is found for all who went west on harvesters' excursions. Thomas Plummer, aged seventy, fell down an elevator shaft, in Toronto, and died of his injuries an hour later.

At Winnipeg, word has just been received that the steamer Wolverine, for which alarm was felt, is safe in port. Mrs. N. Kargus, London, fell downstairs with a lighted lamp, and was so badly burned that she died in the hospital.

Three more cases of small-pox were discovered in Toronto this morning, and the patients were removed to the small-pox hospital.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier will be one of the candidates for Ottawa. Messrs. Fraser and Chevier, the two nominees of the party, have withdrawn.

The alleged keepers and fugitives arrested in the raid by the police on Toronto gambling dens, Tuesday, were arraigned in court and remanded for a week.

At the annual general meeting of the shareholders of the Great North-Western Telegraph company, held in Toronto, to-day, the old directors and officials were re-elected.

At Owen Sound the 'Brighton murder' trial opened on Wednesday with Justice Riddell presiding. G. T. Blacklock is sitting for the crown and Hon. A. G. MacKay for the prisoner.

At Dallas, Texas, fire caused the death of Freeman J. H. Partin, the serious injuries of two women and a property loss estimated at \$200,000 in the heart of the business district.

The jury in the Toronto assize court in the case of Miss Jennie Flade, who sued for \$0,000 against Philip Jamieson, for alleged slanderous remarks made to her, awarded her \$1,600 damages.

The private office of Chairman Hitchcock, in the republican national quarters, is being located, according to his assistant, Mr. Mason, and many letters and notes of importance have been carried away.

The will of Leslie Carter, once a millionaire, was filed for probate, in Chicago, yesterday, disposing of an estate of \$75,000. The estate is divided between a sister and a brother, thus disinheriting a son.

At the Anglican general synod, the committee's report on the enforcement of the law in the Yukon was read. It recommended the improved conditions, as to the dance halls and vice of that district.

A short despatch from Teheran says the imperial troops have suffered defeat, at Tabriz, and as a consequence the British and Russian troops will do their principal supporting in the Harrarian stocks, Reading and St. Paul, but these stocks, too, should be sold on bulges for turns.

In Liverpool the break in wheat, in America, yesterday was an incentive for crop offerings here and as a result opening values were 3-8 lower, and during the morning market was continually under pressure with an additional decline of 1/4. Selling was further encouraged by the favorable crop outlook in Russia. Offerings of Australia cargoes, and Manitoba parcels and the bearish American statistics. WAINWRIGHT'S PROGRESS. Only a Few Weeks Old, But An Important Centre. Situated in one of the most fertile farming districts of Western Canada, York Centre is known as the famous Battle River Valley, just a short distance east of the Baltic river, and up on the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific railway, is the town of Wainwright.

This town is the first divisional point east of Edmonton, and although only a few weeks old, bids fair to be one of the best towns in the west. It has already five general stores, two hardware stores, three lumber yards, all of which are of undoubted standing, and several other business houses of merit to a town of this kind and size.

The surrounding country is well settled with settlers, chiefly Canadian and American. Both the dominion government and the Grand Trunk Pacific have lent their efforts toward building up the town, the former by establishing what will in a very short time be Canada's greatest national park, just to the south-west of the town. It will be known throughout the world as Canada's great buffalo preserve. The Grand Trunk Pacific has commenced the erection of a twelve-stall roundhouse and has a large force of men already at work grading for yards and grading Main street. A choice site has also been reserved for the best part of the town and close to the depot for the erection of a Grand Trunk Pacific hotel, which will be a credit to the railway. Building operations are very active, there being several good buildings in course of erection and others projected.

THE SPORT REVIEW KEN. WILLIAMS RETURNS TO PLAY WITH QUEEN'S.

A Couple Queen's Players Injured—City Senior Rugby Team Called to Practice at the Armouries This Evening.

Queen's had another good practice on Monday afternoon at the upper campus. All the players but three are now in, and are getting into good shape. Pennock, Marshall and Crawford are yet to report for duty, and they are expected next week. 'Ken' Williams returned to the city on Tuesday, and will be at practice to-day.

He is in good condition and should show as good form as he ever did. Coach Crothers has the men well under control, and is getting them familiar with the fine points of the game. Every day new signals and other stunts are gone over, and drilled into the men. From the side lines the team looks good, better and sturdier than last year. A slight accident happened to one of the players during practice. L. L. Buck, an inside wing man, hurt his nose in a tackle. His injuries will not likely keep him out of the game for long. wing man, is out of the game for a few days with a bad head. He had a collision on Saturday which split open the side of his head. He will be out in a few days. The two trainers are a great aid to the players, and are certainly making good.

Collegiate Team's Progress. The Collegiate team was out again on Tuesday, and had a good practice. Birkett's injury is not as serious as at first supposed, and he will likely be in the game again before many weeks. Hedges, and Messrs. Slinger and Hatch, are making rapid strides, and will be in good trim before the first game comes around.

They play in Ottawa one week from Saturday, the same day that Queen's play. The boys won down there last season, and should win again. One Robertson, McCammon and Reid are playing a fine game on the back division, and Meikle is a good quarter.

City Senior Rugby Team. The first practice of the senior football squad is called for the armouries to-night. The boys will likely be replacing a little workout, but the practice is chiefly for the purpose of getting them together. The seniors will likely all be out at work, and will follow with practice in the Cricket field every afternoon. Nearly all the fellows who played last season will probably turn out this year to help the team along. Every player who wants to get out, should be at the armouries to-night.

Lacrosse Club Meets. The Kingston lacrosse team will have its final meeting for the year on Thursday night at the Y.M.C.A., when the year's business will be wound up. The club has had a fairly successful season, and bright hopes are held out for next year. The club has secured the city hall for election night, when the returns from all parts of the dominion will also be put down.

With The Cadets. The senior team should be every bit as strong as last year, and if they are given a good course of training should show up well. A number of new men are being broken in, and are as yet a little new at the game. The second team should also be strong enough to do something.

BALLOON BURST. Formed Parachute and Came Down Slowly.

Dusseldorf, Rhinish Prussia, Germany, Sept. 30.—Capt. Von Abscon and Lieut. Von Goltzheim, two well-known aeronauts, had a miraculous escape from death, yesterday, during the course of an ascent in a spherical balloon. Thousands of spectators had gathered to witness the ascent, and they were horror-stricken as the accident, which occurred high in the air.

On being released from its fastenings, the balloon soared almost directly upwards to an altitude of 6,000 feet, when the envelope suddenly ripped open. The gas escaped in streams, and the balloon shot downward. The aeronauts swiftly clambered into the network in the desperate hope of avoiding the shock of contact with the ground.

After a fall of 2,000 feet, however, the envelope spread out, seemingly in a purely accidental manner, forming a sort of parachute, which checked the descent. The balloon then gradually came down, taking an hour and a half to reach the earth, the two men clinging to the ropes and the basket. They suffered no injury except a few scratches.

Port Colborne, Ont., Sept. 30.—The steamer Prince Rupert, with cargo, Ceylon, in tow, left here last night, at seven o'clock, for Toledo. When she was opposite Morgan's Point the tow line broke and the barge Ceylon drifted down to Second Point, two miles below here, and was now anchored on the point in about nine feet of water. Tugs have gone to her assistance but, as yet, cannot get near the Ceylon. The wind is blowing fresh from the south.

HAS ABOUT COLLAPSED. Terms May Be Arranged For the Men. Winnipeg, Man., Sept. 30.—Indications are that the Canadian Pacific railway mechanics' strike has collapsed. Bell Hardy, who has been conducting the strike from Montreal, arrived on Tuesday, to confer with Vice-President White, and, if possible, arrange for the men to be taken back. It is said, it is also reported, that a message was received from the International Labor Federation, at Washington, advising the men to confer with the company immediately with a view to going back.

She lay in Duncan's bay, yesterday, while the lighter was replacing the twenty-five thousand bushels of corn which were lightered in releasing her.

Will Not Release It. Sofia, Sept. 30.—After two cabinet meetings, the ministry issued a statement to the effect that the government would not abandon the working of the Roumanian section of the Oriental railway which the Bulgarian government seized at the time of the recent strike, but would try to satisfy the claims of the proprietors.

To Have A Joint Tour. Leamington, Ont., Sept. 30.—A. H. Clarke, the sitting member for South Essex, and Arias Wigle, the conservative candidate for the seat next, will commence a joint tour of the riding. The tour will take in all the principal towns and villages.
