OFFERS \$10,000 REWARD.

Seeks to Find Murderer of His Son.

New York, Oct. 1.—Firm in his belief that evidence exists, which, if brought to light, would bring about the arrest and conviction of his son's murderer, Henry Dexter, multi-millionaire and nonagenarian, has made public the announcement that he would pay a reward of \$10,000 for such evidence. Mr. Dexter's son, Orlando Perry Dexter, was shot from ambush on the Dexter estate in the Adirondacks, in September, 1903, but every effort by private detectives and the authorities of Franklin county failed to establish the identity of the murderer.
