

Homestead Regulations.

A NY even-numbered section of Domin-ion Lands in Manitoba or the Northwest Provinces, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person the sole head of a family, or male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-Application for homestead entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency. Entry by proxy may, however, be made by an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader. An application for cancellation must be made in person. The applicant must be

eligible for homestead entry. DUTIES .- (1) At least six months' resieach year during the term of three years. (2) A homesteader may, if he so desires perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.


