**WILL HAVE TO TRAVEL AT A FAST CLIP**

To Defeat Queen's—How Ottawa College Stands—Queen's in Good Condition—Notes on Sport.

The Ottawa Journal says: College will stack up against Queen's at the oval Saturday and the game should be a hummer. The local team is undoubtedly stronger than last season, when they landed the championship, and Queen's is also said to be a stronger aggregation. Both teams have been practising faithfully for some time and will be in shape to stand the pace. The officials will be Dr. Wood and Dr. Wright, of Toronto, the opposing teams having agreed on these men to act. The Queen's team believe that if they can dispose of the College boys they can land the championship and will make a strong bid to win Saturday. Several new candidates for the senior squad are showing up well. The team to play Queen's will not be selected until the end of the week. College are determined to win the first game but realize that they will have to travel at a very fast clip to defeat Queen's.

**THE CHAMPIONSHIP AT QUEEN'S SPORTS.**

**Two Records Were Broken, the Running Broad Jump and Throwing the Discus—Queen's Runner Fouled By a Cadet.**

On Wednesday afternoon Queen's annual field sports were held, and were a complete success. The weather was fine for the events, nice and cool and very little wind. About four hundred people were present and all were more than satisfied with the showing made by the collegians. The sports this year were better than in previous years. At Wednesday's meet two records were broken, the running broad jump and throwing the discus. The first record was broken by James Mackinnon, of Cape Breton, a first year man. The old record was 20 feet 3 inches, and Mackinnon cleared 20 feet 8 1/2 inches with ease. The discus record was broken by H. G. Bertram, Toronto, of year '10. He threw the discus 98 feet 6 1/2 inches, or 4 1/2 inches over the record made by H. Mackinnon in 1907.

Kenneth Williams, of Kingston, landed the individual championship for scoring the greatest number of points at the meet. He secured three first, one second and two thirds, totalling thirteen points. He had a good lead at the end. Williams is developing into a fine all-around athlete and his work on Wednesday was a pleasant surprise to a great many of his friends. The year championship

was easily won by '09 with sixty-nine points, year '12 being second, with twenty-five and one-half. Men lead from the first event and there was only one event pulled off in which they did not make one or more points. The different events were won as follows: Running high jump—Cadenhead, 5 feet 2 1/2 inches; Arnoldi, R.M.C., second; Hattott, R.M.C., third. 220 yards' dash—K. Williams, 11 seconds; first; Ramsay, second; R. McKinnon, third. Throwing the discus—H. Bertram, 98 feet 6 1/2 inches; first; J. McKinnon, second; G. Bertram, third. 220 yards' dash—Williams, 25 seconds; first; McKenzie, R.M.C., second; Burnham, R.M.C., third. Pole vault—J. B. Saint, 8 feet 6 inches; first; Leatherland, second; McKinnon, third. In this event Saint tried for a record, but failed three times in trying to jump 9 feet 11 inches, a half inch above record.

Half mile run—Lindsay, R.M.C., first, 2 1/2 min., 11 3/5 seconds; Orr, second; Skene, third. This race was run over twice. In the first trial, just after the runners got to the first turn, Arnoldi, a cadet, was pacing Lindsay; Orr went to pass and Arnoldi ran over to one side. In doing so he collided with Orr and the latter fell to the ground. Arnoldi dropped out, but Orr finished the half, finishing second. After the race the judges had a meeting and decided to throw the race out and have it run over again, counting the occurrence as a foul on the part of the R.M.C. Arnoldi was not allowed to run in any more events.

Running broad jump—J. McKinnon, 29 feet, 5 1/2 inches; first; J. E. Carmichael, second; K. Williams, third. Running hop, step and jump—Williams, 40 feet 8 1/2 inches; first; Cadenhead, second; J. McKinnon, third. Shot put (16 pounds)—J. McKinnon, 33 feet 1 inch; first; Williams, second; Carmichael, third. Quarter-mile race—Orr, 56 2/5 sec.; first; Carmichael, second; Ramsay, third.

Throwing the hammer (16 pounds)—H. G. Bertram, 88 feet 9 1/2 inches; J. McKinnon, third. 120 yards, hurdles—J. B. Saint, 20 seconds; Cadenhead, second; Williams, third. Mile run—Watts, R.M.C., 4 min., 54 seconds; first; Lindsay, R.M.C., second; Goodwin, third. Team relay race—'09 first; '11 second; '12 third.

These events showed that every year Queen's is improving greatly along this line, and at the intercollegiate meet this year should score far more points than she did last season. Every man who took part on Wednesday was in good condition and the work did not seem to distress any of them to any degree.

Hon. R. L. Borden and A. Claude Macdonnell, M.P., of Toronto, accompanied by D. M. McIntyre, T. J. Rigney, H. C. Nickle, W. R. Givens, W. F. Nickle, M.P.P., and others, visited the games. The judges and referee were presented to the opposition leader, who expressed himself as greatly pleased with what he saw.
