

CONSULATE ATTACKED AND AUSTRIAN WARSHIPS SENT TO RESCUE.

A Mob Incident in Montenegro— Rumored That the Austrian Minister to Serbia Has Been Assassinated.

Vienna, Oct. 12.—There is a rumor current that Count Ferber, the Austrian minister to Serbia, has been assassinated. The foreign office discredits it.

The Work of a Mob.

Buda Pest, Oct. 12.—The Austrian consulate at Antofagasta, Montenegro, was attacked, today, by a mob, which tore the Austrian coat-of-arms from the door, burned it in the street and then sacked the building.

To Support Government.

Belgrade, Oct. 12.—The national assembly, this morning, resolved to support the government to its fullest extent.

A Crying Wrong.

Cetinje, Montenegro, Oct. 12.—The Montenegrin national assembly opened here, today, in extraordinary session. The war fever has been strengthened by a bellicose message to parliament from Prince Nicholas, who declared that the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina by Austria had inflicted a crying wrong upon the people of Montenegro and that the people were prepared to sacrifice their last drop of blood unless the peaceful endeavors now on foot succeeded in righting this grievance.

Voted the Union.

Canen, Isle of Crete, Oct. 12.—Parliament met this morning and formally voted the union of the island with Greece. The Moslem delegates were not present.

A Friendly Solution.

London, Oct. 12.—The news received this morning from the storm centres in the near east confirms the belief held in London that the powers will find a friendly solution of the crisis which has agitated Europe for more than a week.

Fall of Ministry Imminent.

London, Oct. 12.—The Daily Mail Belgrade correspondent, says the fall of the Serbian ministry is imminent, and that a coalition cabinet will be formed.

Voted Big Sum.

Belgrade, Oct. 12.—The Serbian national assembly today voted three million dollars as an extraordinary military appropriation. Despite war preparations and expressions, there is a quiet feeling among the people due to the recognition of Serbia's unpreparedness for war.

Must Face \$80,000 Shortage.

Denver, Col., Oct. 12.—Charged with a shortage of \$80,000 and with having received deposits when he knew his bank was insolvent, Aaron G. Pratt, cashier of the Hammond State Bank, of Hammond, left Denver, last night, in custody for Hammond, where he was arrested at Longmont, Col., where he was interested in irrigation enterprises, and he waived extradition proceedings.

Captain Will Appeal.

Ottawa, Oct. 12.—The Ottawa electric company will appeal against the verdict of \$5,500 awarded to Lena Moran, whose leg was taken off as a result of the car accident at Britannia May 24th last. They claim the amount is excessive.

THE BALLOON BURST WHEN IT WAS 4,000 FEET IN THE AIR.

Occupants Had a Close Call—They Were Slightly Injured—Silk Acted As Parachute.

Berlin, Oct. 12.—The international balloon race, which started Sunday, from the suburb of Schmargendorf, was the occasion of a thrilling accident, two American aeronauts having a miraculous escape from death. The American-built craft in the contest, having on board A. Holland Forbes and Augustus Post, less than two minutes after the start, burst at an altitude of 4,000 feet. For 2,000 feet it shot down like a bullet, and then the silk assumed the shape of a parachute, and the rapidity of the descent was checked.

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FIELD CROPS YIELD THE RETURNS BASED ON THRESHING RESULTS.

Wheat Amounts to 115,631,000 Bushels—Figures Showing the Great Productive Ability of Canadian Soil.

Ottawa, Oct. 12.—A bulletin on the estimated yield and quality of field crops in Canada was given out by the census and statistics office Saturday. The returns are based upon actual threshing results, so far as these have been obtained. The average yield of wheat is estimated at 17 1/2 bushels per acre, indicating a total production of 115,631,000 bushels; oats, 33.7 bushels per acre, total production 267,651,000 bushels; barley, 29.0 bushels per acre, total production 30,723,000 bushels; and rye, 18.8 bushels per acre, total production 1,889,000 bushels.
