A POST-MORTEM HELD OVER THE REMAINS OF CAPT. J. H. SCOTT.

Death Was Due to Drowning—The Post-Mortem Determined That An Accident Policy Should Be Paid.

A post-mortem examination was held this morning on the remains of the late Capt. J. H. Scott, found in the water at Swift's wharf on Monday morning, by Prof. W. T. Connell, of Queen's Medical college, who found that death was due to drowning. The condition of all the organs bore out the above verdict. The doctor said that the reason of the body being found on the top of the water was that the deceased was a stout man and the cold water would have a tendency to bring him to the surface. The examination was held because the accident insurance company with which the deceased was insured wanted to determine the exact cause of death.

The funeral of the late Capt. Scott took place at three o'clock this afternoon from the residence of Dr. J. H. Bell, Wellington street. Services were conducted by the Rev. C. A. Sykes, of whose church the deceased was a member. The casket was covered with a number of handsome floral tributes from friends and relatives, including a handsome wreath from the Catarqui lodge of Masons, of which the deceased was a life member.

John L. Pope's Statement.
John L. Pope says he was with the late Capt. J. H. Scott from three o'clock Sunday afternoon till 10:50 o'clock that night. The two of them left the Grimsom hotel at 10:20 p.m., Mr. Pope carrying Capt. Scott's valise. They went down to the steamer Rideau King, where the valise was deposited. Capt. Scott left the boat and accompanied Mr. Pope to Clarence street, where he pulled out his watch and stated that it was ten minutes to eleven o'clock. They then parted, Capt. Scott returning to the steamer to go to his berth. Thus Mr. Pope was with the captain till within ten minutes of his death.

The corps consists of Sergeant, Danck, Corporal Thomas and Privates Douglas, Crawford, Flett, Canam and Robinson.

No one can vote (except a few specially classed by section II, dominion elections act) unless his name is on the list as furnished to the deputy returning officer through the returning officer.

A VOICE FROM OTTAWA

SPEAKS FOR THE RETURN OF HON. MR. HARTY

To Represent One of the "Seats of the Mighty"—Kingston Should Be Represented by a Man of His Type.

Ottawa, Oct. 12.—(To the Editor): As you are aware there is a Kingston Club in Ottawa, where there are quite a few Kingstonians. As one of them, I was more than pleased to read in your paper that Mr. Hartly had consented to again be the candidate of the liberal party, and of the majority of the citizens of Kingston.

Residing at the capital and having opportunity of viewing parliament at close quarters, I can testify to the leading position occupied by Kingston's representative. It would bring to me a feeling of humiliation if my native city was represented in the high court of parliament by any one smaller than a first-class man.

It is only once in a long time that a debate in the House of Commons is of first importance. The work in the committees, the views urged upon government, the exchange of opinion outside the house, and by correspondence—in these and other ways a member makes himself a potent factor in government. I would venture to say that Mr. Hartly knows what is going on, and what is going to happen better than any other private member. Constant in attendance, alert and vigilant, Mr. Hartly knows his house "down to the ground." I could not imagine him being caught napping. Might as well catch a weasel asleep.

When large questions are looming up the government are bound to feel the pulse of public opinion, and, in matters of constructive policy, they seek the opinion and aid of those members in whose sagacity they have confidence. Of necessity the enquiry is limited, but it is well known here that one of the first of such members is Mr. Hartly. He is known to have the wisdom born of great experience, and the good judgment of an astute business man. In other words he is generally regarded as a man to take into account.

For that reason, then, that Mr. Hartly is a national figure at Ottawa and Kingston, one of the "seats of the mighty," I repeat that it flatters my pride as an ardent Kingstonian to know that our historic and royal city will be fittingly represented in parliament for at least another term.

I might add, lest any one should should think that the above was prompted by interest, that the writer is not in the employment of the government.—RIDEAU.
